Implementing Innovative Programs to Stem the Nursing Shortage

significant nursing shortage is of concern nationwide. The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) of the US Department of Health and Human Services projects that by Year 2020, 44 States and the District of Columbia will have nursing shortages (2002). While Connecticut had a 12% shortage in Year 2000 (supply: 26, 407; demand: 30,137), HRSA projects that Connecticut will experience a 54.9% shortage by Year 2020 (supply: 17,870; demand: 39,661).

Nationwide impacts on nursing field

Factors influencing the nursing shortage nationally are broad, and include declining numbers of nursing school graduates, the aging of the RN workforce, declines in relative earnings, and the emergence of alternative job opportunities for women, who make up the largest segment of the nursing workforce. Data on the growth in new RNs, as measured by those passing

the RN licensing test (NCLEX), show that after growing steadily during the first half of the 1990s, the number of new RN graduates fell annually in the last half of the decade, resulting in 26% fewer RN graduates in 2000 than in 1995. Declines in graduates across all degree programs -- diploma, associate degree, and baccalaureate -occurred during the last half of the 1990s. The American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) reported a 4% increase in baccalaureate enrollments between 2000 and 2001, however, students in these programs will not complete their programs for roughly two to four years, depending on their academic history and progress (HRSA, 2002).

SON addresses growing concern

Although the School of Nursing cannot manage the shortage alone, faculty and staff have made significant contributions to stemming the shortage.

First, the School admitted the first class of 24 students to a newly-established
Master's Entry Into
Nursing (MbEIN)
program in January,
2003. Granted full
approval on February 6,
2002 by the
Connecticut Board of
Examiners for
Nursing, the MbEIN
program is a 45-credit,
one calendar year
program in generic nursing,

culminating in a certificate that establishes eligibility for both the licensing examination (NCLEX) in CT and enrollment in the master's program in nursing at UConn. This program is for a restricted pool of applicants who hold bachelor's degrees in non-nursing fields and have completed a comprehensive set of science and liberal arts prerequisites. Candidates' undergraduate GPAs must be greater than 3.0 for admission consideration. The inaugural class entered nursing practice and/or graduate work in January 2004 when the 2nd class of 30 students entered the program. On graduation of the first class (all of whom have been successful in their NCLEX examinations to date), the Board of Nursing scheduled an initial program review.

Leadership serves on statewide committees, taskforces

The Dean represented the School in evaluating the existing model of articulation for nursing education in Connecticut during Academic Year 2002, serving on the Connecticut League for Nursing Articulation Oversight Committee, the Statewide Advisory Council on Student Transfer and Articulation, and the Nursing Articulation Sub-Committee of the Connecticut Department of Higher Education. Following a December workshop with Mary Rapson, PhD, RN, FAAN, a nationally known expert in articulation, Connecticut's Council of Deans and Directors

revised the articulation model, formulating an escrow model, and changing the focus of nursing articulation from program to student. The revised Connecticut Articulation Model for Nurse Educational Mobility provides for transfer credits to be put in escrow until such time as students seeking advanced education complete a first nursing course that allows them to demonstrate prerequisite knowledge, skills, and attitudes for professional nursing. The revised model is being actively used by the School's Academic Advisory Center staff as they work with RN students to help them access master's degrees in nursing.

Since 1992, graduates of practical and registered nursing programs in Connecticut have benefited from the uniform granting of credit creating accessible pathways to advanced education and facilitating educational mobility.

Compact enhances availability of resources statewide

Adding to our efforts to support streamlined nursing education, the

UConn for upper division nursing coursework. The compact helps to make faculty and clinical resources best available to students statewide.

SON vision is clear

The SON has a clear, strong, proactive strategy for expanding the financial resources for the School. The Dean and external relations staff are focused on a balanced and effective series of activities to strengthen relationships with oncampus units and with external individuals and groups. To date, we have raised over 82% of the Campaign UConn goal, representing about \$2.5 million. Mary Ellen (Mell) Hobson '77 '86 ably serves as Chair of the School's Advisory Board. School events are wellattended and have been evaluated by consultants as outstanding, wellexecuted, and thoroughly followedup. These events support strong connections among the vision, mission, and work of the School of Nursing. Involvement with alumni and emeriti is increasing annually, and more and more, people are coming home to UConn.

Center for Nursing Research (CNR) News

Nursing faculty submitted an all time high number of grant proposals, 13, in the 2002-2003 fiscal year. Multiple proposals have been sent out since the beginning of the 2003-2004 fiscal year and rather than sit back and wait the three to six months to hear about funding. faculty are busy getting their next proposals together. All are excited that Sheila Taylor has joined the CNR full time as administrative assistant. Ms. Taylor comes to us with a background in computer technology and a degree in sociology from Eastern Connecticut State University and most recently worked in Traffic Services. (No, she can't fix your tickets!) Ms. Taylor will be providing faculty with assistance with proposal and budget development and the grant

application process. She will act as liaison with the Preaward and Postaward OSP personnel. She plans to develop an online grant proposal tracking system and will become the webmaster for the CNR site where requests for applications, conference calls, etc. will be posted. Efforts are underway with Brian LaChapelle of the UConn Foundation to pursue donor funding for new computer equipment in the lab. We were recently given a high end GCC Tech Elite XL 20/800 printer that can be networked to all Windows '00 workstations. Currently we have a mix of older (Windows '95 and '98) and new (Windows '00) desktop

computers. Upgrading all the computers to a consistent interface will facilitate teaching research methods to groups of students so that each desktop has the same software and connectivity. As they are replaced, the older CNR computers, will find homes in the student lounges as email/web terminals.

As our student numbers and class sizes continue to grow (570 undergraduates), faculty research productivity has also increased as evidenced by the over 130 SON articles and presentations last year. Our research really does drive student interest and vice versa! Soon a display featuring faculty and student publications will be installed on the wall outside the CNR. Neafsey & EPA look at Xenobiotics/Polymorphism Research

Pat (P.J.) Neafsey's best known work is aimed at reducing adverse selfmedication practices in older adults. However, she also has another line of research -- developing mathematical models to predict risk from exposure to toxic substances. Recently she has been working on an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) grant headed by Gary Ginsberg, PhD, State Toxicologist (CT State Dept. of Health) and Dale Hattis, PhD, Professor, Clark University. The purpose of the project is to develop a database of information concerning the frequency of various 'polymorphisms' or genetic variants in human enzymes that metabolize drugs and other foreign compounds known as xenobiotics. Xenobiotics include such substances as pesticides, cancer causing nitrosamines in tobacco, and street drugs such as ecstasy. The research team pooled geneotype frequency and enzyme function data from population studies. Then they used a mathematical procedure called a 'Monte Carlo simulation' to predict the population distributions of enzyme activity.

Their findings will have a practical use not only in risk assessment, but also for Nurse Practitioners and physician prescribers. For example, one of the enzymes studied, CYP2D6, is involved in the metabolism of about a quarter of currently prescribed drugs. A distinct bimodal distribution of CYP2D6 activity was found among both Caucasians and African-Americans. Nearly 20% of each population were "poor metabolizers" having 3-fold less activity than the population median. And more than a quarter of the poor metabolizers had more than a 10-fold lower CYP2D6 activity than the population median. If an individual is a poor metabolizer and is on a medication (and/or exposed to a xenobiotic) metabolized by CYP2D6, adverse sideeffects may be more likely.

In the future, prescribers will be able to order genotype and enzyme function tests for CYP2D6 and other drug metabolizing enzymes. This will improve the ability of prescribers to select appropriate dosing regimens for their patients. Until then, health care

providers need to consider that individuals may be exhibiting adverse effects from medication and/or xenobiotics as a result of their particular drug metabolizing genotype.

International Medical Informatics Association Names Article "Best of Medical Informatics"

An international editorial board appointed by the International Medical Informatics Association (IMIA, with over 7,000 members) has named an article by P.J. Neafsey, Z. Strickler, J. Shellman, and V. Chartier published in *Public Health Nursing* as one of "the best

of medical informatics articles." The article was named for its "scientific content and quality of medical informatics." It will be reprinted in the 2004 IMIA Yearbook of Medical Informatics.

Bassi adds to the School's efforts to support streamlined nursing education by directing the Compact Agreement with Three Rivers Community College in Norwich. Bassi leads the cohort of nursing students at the UConn Avery Point Campus and assists in working with qualified students from Three Rivers Community College in Norwich who have gained admission to the School of Nursing. Through the Compact Agreement these students are eligible for transfer to UConn for upper division nursing coursework upon completing prerequisite coursework for nursing at Three Rivers. Bassi's leadership role exemplifies UConn's goal to make nursing faculty and clinical resources more available to students statewide. Most recently, Bassi has been expanding the School's clinical sites in community health to southeastern Connecticut.

Chanyeong Kwak, PhD, CCRN, Assistant Professor - since September 2003

Raised in Korea, Kwak earned her bachelor's degree in nursing at Seoul National University while dreaming of one day becoming a teacher. In 1990, Kwak moved to the United States with her husband and two - now teenaged - daughters.

She enrolled in Yale University and completed her Master of Science as a cardiovascular clinical nurse specialist in 1996. Early in her nursing career, when working at various health care settings as a clinical educator, Kwak became interested in health policy. Kwak's path to become a nurse scholar led her to a Health Policy Internship in South Korea with the Ministry of the Department of Health and Welfare in 1999, and the completion of a PhD from the University of Massachusetts/Boston in 2001.

Before joining the faculty at UConn, Kwak was an assistant professor at the University of Rhode Island School of Nursing. Kwak's research focuses on efficiency and equity in the health care delivery system and examines the cultural/racial differences and disparities in health status and health care services. In 2002, the second edition of Kwak's *Asian and Asian American Health Educators Speak Out: Long term care delivery system in Korea* was printed by Jones & Bartlett Publishers. In 2003, Kwak was invited to become a reviewer for the *Journal of Nursing Research*. Her expertise in quantitative and survey research methods and her knowledge of advanced statistical techniques are an asset to UConn's graduate nursing research curriculum.

Kwak enjoys reading, spending time with her family, and embracing the two distinct cultures of Korea and America.

Juliette Shellman '99 MS, '03 PhD, CS, RN, Assistant Professor - since September 2002

Building upon her successful reminiscence research program, Dr. Juliette Shellman's newest study, *The Effects of a Structured Reminiscence Program on Depression and Life Satisfaction in African-American Elders*, received funding through a UConn Research Foundation Large Grant (\$23,224). Shellman's research program addresses challenges nurses face in delivering culturally competent care to a growing and aging elderly population. The projected rise in elders' cultural and racial diversity prompted Shellman to find support for the use of reminiscence as an intervention to decrease depression and improve the quality of care provided to elders.

In her previous research, Shellman demonstrated that using a reminiscence education program had a positive effect on nursing students' perceptions of eldercare cultural self-efficacy. Shellman is a consultant to the Visiting Nurse Association of Central Connecticut, Inc. supporting the continued development of the CareLink Program. CareLink is an award winning, campus-



community partnership through which undergraduate students provide supervised services to a community of elders. Through the CareLink Program, students have delivered about \$303,000 of uncompensated care to over 420 elders in the central Connecticut area.



Innovative Longitudinal Research on Breast Cancer & Neurocognitive Status

Amy Kenefick, PhD, FNP, CNM, Assistant Professor

Dr. Amy Kenefick aids the battle against breast cancer with her new \$200,000 Clinical Nurse Research Award from the Department of Defense (DOD). Kenefick has embarked on a longitudinal descriptive study of the relationship between neurocognitive function (NCF), symptom distress, functional status, and induced menopause in women receiving chemotherapy for breast cancer. Her subjects will be compared to a group of women experiencing surgically-induced menopause. Kenefick found that while there has been some speculation about the role of chemotherapy-induced menopause in neurocognitive function, there have been no longitudinal studies with appropriate baseline

and repeated measures that can provide meaningful information about neurocognitive status over time. Women, themselves, express distress over perceived neurocognitive changes, yet there is little known about the subject.

Building upon her extensive clinical background in women's health care and geriatrics (with previous research support from Sigma Theta Tau and the American Nurses Foundation), Kenefick is now preparing to become an independent breast cancer researcher. Kenefick's *Research Training Program in Breast Cancer* was developed during her Post-Doctoral Fellowship, funded by a \$38,712 grant in 2002-2003 through Dr. Ruth McCorkle's DOD Breast Cancer Research Program. Kenefick's Fellowship at Yale University promotes ongoing interdisciplinary collaboration between the University of Connecticut and Yale while building Kenefick's advanced research skills under the mentorship of Dr. McCorkle, a world-renowned cancer researcher. Reflecting on her progress Kenefick said, "I am delighted to have the privilege of joining the cohort of talented nurse-researchers who have worked with Dr. McCorkle."

Regina Cusson, PhD, RNC, NNP, Professor and PhD Program & Neonatal Nurse Master's Track Coordinator, has been recommended by the Council for International Exchange of Scholars for a Lecturing/Research award under the 2004-05 Fulbright Program with the United Kingdom. Final determination of an award will be made by the United States-United Kingdom Educational Commission in London. Cusson has been invited to spend her sabbatical leave at the Florence Nightingale School of Nursing and Midwifery lecturing and examining neonatal advanced practice roles.

Arthur Engler, DNSc, RNC, CRNP, Assistant Professor, was awarded a \$22,234 Large Faculty Grant from the UConn Research Foundation for his project entitled *Kangaroo Care and Maternal Stress in the NICU: Psychological and Physiological Effects.*

Collaborative Research Focuses on Older Adult Pain

Deborah McDonald '81, PhD, RN, Associate Professor

Older adults who effectively communicate their postoperative pain are more likely to become partners in pain management with their healthcare providers, and obtain greater pain relief. Greater pain relief allows older adults to recover more quickly from surgery, and to regain an active healthy lifestyle. Dr. Deborah McDonald's videotape, teaching older adults about pain communication and pain management, resulted in significantly less pain-related sleep disruption for patients on postoperative day one (McDonald, Thomas, Livingston, & Severson, 2003). The pain relief occurred without pain education for the nurses and physicians.

The aim of a new study proposed by McDonald is to test the effect of the video when paired with a web-based intervention teaching nurses and physicians pain communication and pain management. Nurses at two sites will be given pain communication/pain management education via the website. These providers will access the website, and take a pre-test learning needs assessment. Incorrect answers will

automatically link providers to correct information on the website. Providers will be given personal data assistant (PDA) devices programmed with pain management information such as equianalgesic calculations and a script for neuromuscular relaxation, for use at the bedside.

Upon completion of the provider education, 155 older adults will be randomly assigned across four hospital sites to the pain communication/pain management or the pain management only group. McDonald and her colleagues predict that greater pain relief will occur when older adults and providers communicate well about pain problems and are more knowledgeable about effective pain management.

If funded, the study will involve collaboration between the University of Connecticut, Wayne State University, The University of Connecticut Health Center, Saint Francis Hospital and Medical Center, Hospital of Saint Raphael, Middlesex Hospital and Bridgeport Hospital.

Postpartum Research Receives International Attention

Cheryl Beck, DNSc, CNM, FAAN, Professor

Dr. Cheryl Beck, has just completed her three-year grant from the Donaghue Medical Research Foundation to translate and assess the psychometric properties of the Spanish version of the Postpartum Depression Screening Scale (PDSS). Hispanic mothers from two areas of the US (CT and TX) were recruited to participate in two separate studies. Robin Froman '84'87 PhD, RN, FAAN was the site coordinator in Texas for the project. In the first study, 377 Hispanic women completed the Spanish version of the PDSS. Data analysis revealed that when compared to the original English PDSS, the reliability and validity psychometrics for the Spanish version were slightly lower but still well within the acceptable range. To determine the accuracy of the PDSS-Spanish Version a second study with 150 Hispanic mothers was conducted. Each mother in this study completed the PDSS-Spanish Version and then immediately went on to undergo a DSM-IV diagnostic interview to determine whether she was experiencing postpartum

depression. Currently, with the statistical help of Robert Gable, EdD, Emeritus Professor from the Department of Educational Psychology at UConn's School of Education, and Joseph Sheehan, PhD, Professor in the Department of Community Medicine at UCHC, the sensitivity, specificity and cut-off points for the Spanish version are being analyzed. The project could not have been completed with the invaluable help of Henrietta Bernal, PhD, RN, Emeritus Professor in the School of Nursing at UConn. Dr. Beck will be an invited speaker this coming May in Tarragona, Spain at the National Spanish Midwifery Congress. She will present the findings from her PDSS-Spanish Version project, along with the results from a two-year qualitative study on birth trauma and PTSD after childbirth.

For the past two years, Professor Beck has conducted a phenomenological study over the internet on birth trauma and PTSD after childbirth. With the enthusiastic support and help of Sue Watson, the chairperson of Trauma and Birth Stress (TABS), new mothers were recruited to participate in this research. TABS is a charitable trust in New Zealand. TABS supports women who have experienced birth trauma and educates health care professionals and the lay public about PTSD after childbirth. To date 45 mothers have participated in the study. Over half of the sample (N=26, 57%) are from New Zealand, while nine mothers (20%) are from the U.S., seven mothers are from Australia (16%), and three women (7%) are from the United Kingdom. Beck reported her preliminary findings in September, 2003 in New Zealand at the TABS conference.

This spring, Professor Beck is conducting research on screening for postpartum depression in Capetown, South Africa.

Improving Quality of Life for Persons with HIV/AIDS

Elizabeth Anderson, PhD, APRN, Assistant Professor

Exploring adherence to medications for persons with HIV/AIDS, Dr. Elizabeth Anderson's recently completed research focused specifically on the influence of Health Care Relationships (HCR) on patient outcomes.

Funded by a grant from the Program for the Study of Health Care Relationships (Patrick and Catherine Weldon Donaghue Medical Research Foundation, Yale University, & University of Connecticut School of Nursing) Anderson's study revealed that the HCR significantly affects patients' self-efficacy, quality of life, and mood. Central factors important in the relationship process for persons with HIV/AIDS are Trust (expert in HIV/AIDS), Empathy (caring, being there for them), and Communication Style (listening, talking straight, explaining the disease). HCR strongly influenced Anderson's participants' choice of a health care provider, the taking of their medications, and keeping


appointments. While further investigation of HCR is necessary, Anderson happily reported, "On the whole this sample was extremely satisfied with their current health care providers and reported taking their medications in order to live longer."

Anderson next aims to research the experience, feasibility, and effectiveness of a Progressive Muscle Relaxation Training (PMRT) intervention in reducing anxiety/nausea among economically disadvantaged persons with HIV/AIDS. Anxiety, HIV medication, and disease progression are often associated with nausea that contributes to disruption of quality of life, nutritional status, and medication adherence for HIV/AIDS patients. Although the effectiveness of PMRT in reducing anxiety/nausea in persons with cancer is well-established. no studies have focused on PMRT for community based HIV/AIDS patients' self-management of anxiety and/or nausea.

he School of Nursing is quickly approaching the conclusion of *Campaign UConn*, the most ambitious fundraising campaign ever undertaken by any public university in New England. As of February 29, 2004, with four months remaining to the close of the campaign, \$2,486,718 had been secured in pledges and gifts for the School of Nursing taking us to 82.8% percent of the School's \$3,000,000 campaign goal. The School's campaign, UConnect to Nursing, seeks to secure financial support in four crucial areas:

First, to endow chairs and professorships to attract and retain outstanding faculty, critical for any outstanding school.

Endowed chairs are a key to our future goals, providing flexibility for faculty research initiatives, and attracting internationally eminent scholars — academic leaders who can, in turn, attract other top researchers, teachers, and graduate students to the School.

Second, to enhance research expertise, the School has established the School of Nursing Endowment for Excellence to provide the funding necessary to address its top priorities.

Third, to increase scholarship support for undergraduate, master's and doctoral students through endowed and restricted scholarships. During the past year, several new scholarships were established, including the Elsa Kosgalwies Adomat Nursing Scholarship; the Frank P. Chinigo Endowed Scholarship; the Connelly Endowed Scholarship, with gifts from the estates of Mary M. and Kathryn E. Connelly; the Julia Ireland Scholarship; the Nightingale Scholarship; and the Robert and Margaret Patricelli Family Foundation Endowed Scholarship.

Finally, to fund existing programs — including lectures, research seminars, and visiting scholars — as well as new programs.

The Basic Nursing Certificate program (or Master's Entry Into Nursing—MbEIN) is a new 12-month program for students who hold baccalaureate or higher degrees in fields other than nursing. The program was initiated to increase the number of nurses practicing at the bedside in advanced practice positions and in nursing education and research. Webster Trust Co. NA, Trustee of the Paul L. Jones Fund, has recently made a multi-year pledge of \$300,000 to provide scholarship support for this innovative program.

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

Michel '03, Former Undergraduate Honors Scholar, Publishes Findings



Results of a survey conducted by honors scholar Ruth Michel '03 RN suggest a need for teaching both patients and practitioners about the potential interaction between calcium carbonate (e.g. Tums, other calcium supplements) and levothyroxine. Calcium, iron, and magnesium supplements should be spaced at least four hours apart from levothyroxine as published research suggests that taking minerals within four hours of levothyroxine reduces levothyroxine absorption by nearly a third. The School of Nursing Josephine A. Dolan Distinguished Service Award was established in 2002 to honor Josephine A. Dolan, MS, RN, PdD, DNSc, Professor Emerita. The award will be given annually in her honor.

Josephine A. Dolan, a graduate of St. John's Hospital School of Nursing (Lowell, MA), received her baccalaureate and master's degrees from Boston University, and honorary doctorates from Rhode Island College and Boston College. She achieved a national reputation as a nurse historian and her contributions to nursing education and nursing scholarship. Best known as the author of the history text Nursing in Society, in 1958 Dr. Dolan succeeded Minnie Goodnow as author of the nursing history series. Dr. Dolan, the School's beloved first professor has an enviable record of professional service at the local, state, and national levels. Her teaching, journal articles, reviews, keynote addresses, consultancies, and committee memberships, and general presence have positively influenced many people - Thank You Jo!

The Carolyn Ladd Widmer building, built in 1919, was the University of Connecticut's first infirmary. It contained an open ward for patients, several private rooms, office space and a large solarium with a fireplace. The School of Nursing first occupied the Widmer Building, also known as "the cottage", in 1950 when the present day infirmary was constructed. Conversion of the building's open ward into a classroom, and the private rooms into offices, made the space suitable for academic purposes. For the Nursing School,

this relieved a decade of being in confined quarters in the Home Economics building. From the mid 1950s until the 1968-69 academic year, the building was shared with the School of Physical Therapy. The significant structural deterioration and potential exorbitant costs to relocate the building prompted a decision to demolish "the cottage" in December 1996.

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Family practices philanthropic awareness for future generations

The Story Behind the Patricellis' Gift to UConn

Both Bob and Margaret Patricelli are health care administration professionals in the true sense of the word. They have immersed themselves in the field, contributing to it at every level but actual clinical practice. "I love this field!" said Margaret. "Health care, or its absence, affects everyone. It's a constantly changing field, in which technology and demographics play powerful roles."

Health services have been an integral part of their lives, so it was fitting to Bob and Margaret that they establish the Robert & Margaret Patricelli Family Foundation Scholarship for the School of Nursing. John Wilson, the foundation's executive director, has extensive experience in Hartford area community service organizations. Margaret and John make frequent site visits to their grantees. "Reversing the shortage of nurses and maintaining excellence in nursing training are critical issues in today's health care system," Margaret affirms. "We find it especially gratifying to meet with those responsible for providing health care services that directly benefit the community." She went on, "Having the opportunity recently to meet Stacey Bentil, the current recipient of the Patricelli Family Foundation Scholarship gave us a deeper appreciation for how this gift to the School of Nursing is opening doors to Hartford students with strong interest in the field."

John Wilson agreed, giving additional insight into the family's decision to endow a scholarship at UConn. "Bob and I have known each other for 30 years. He knows Greater Hartford better than most," John said. "We bounce ideas off each other. Bob and Margaret wanted to provide financial assistance to enable Hartford youths to study in the health care field, and a scholarship at the UConn School of Nursing was the answer."

It did not appear initially that either of the Patricellis would choose health care as a career. Although he was accepted at medical school, Bob decided to attend Harvard Law School. Margaret majored in art history as an undergraduate. Soon she found her calling, though, earning her Master of Public Health at UCLA. Following graduation, she started her career in health services research at Harvard and later, advanced her knowledge at a hospital regulatory agency in Massachusetts. After law school, Bob, a former Fulbright Scholar, worked for a time in government, serving as a deputy undersecretary of the federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and as a minority counsel to a U.S. Senate subcommittee before later joining CIGNA. As an executive vice president of the parent company and president of CIGNA's health care group, he became an expert in the field.

He is now founder, chairman and CEO of Evolution Benefits, Inc., a young company that helps companies manage defined contribution benefits, providing electronic payment technology services. Bob is also the founder, chairman and CEO of Women's Health USA, which provides a broad array of services to the health care industry, from clinical trials to industry consulting to practice management services.

When she moved to Connecticut to work at CIGNA in employee benefits and health care, Margaret's path converged with Bob's and the rest was history. After ten years at CIGNA, where her focus was on marketing communications and government relations, Margaret moved to CT Public Television where she produced documentaries and news stories on health and social welfare issues. She went on to manage public affairs for ConnectiCare, a non-profit health maintenance organization.

Margaret currently serves on the Executive Committee of the Board of both the Mark Twain House & Museum, and Planned Parenthood of Connecticut. She is a member of the School of Nursing Advisory Board, and has been to rural Haiti three times (most recently with Bob last January), volunteering in a community health and education program which serves over 200,000

people. The program is directed full time in Haiti by School of Nursing Distinguished Alumnae Award recipient Bette Gebrian, RN, MPH, PhD.

Another subject close to Margaret's heart, other than Bob and their children and grandchildren, is philanthropy. The couple's gift to the School of Nursing was made through the Robert & Margaret Patricelli Family Foundation, Inc. "All of us—Bob, his daughter Alison and son Thomas are officers of the family's foundation; we think building philanthropic awareness and experience among the family is important for future generations," she stated.

Dr. Laura Dzurec, Dean of the School of Nursing, said, "Margaret and Bob understand the value of private philanthropy in changing lives.
