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

# Research: Postpartum Mood Disorders

An Up-Close Look at Postpartum Depression by an Outstanding Researcher: Cheryl Beck

# Grabbing The Nation's Attention:

r. Cheryl Beck's Postpartum Depression

Screening Scale (PDSS) has rolled off the presses into the hands of many health

care professionals who have long awaited the survey.

Beck and Robert Gable, EdD, emeritus professor of educational psychology and co-creator of the PDSS, have found tremendous national and international interest in the PDSS. For some time, but especially since the verdict of the Andrea Yates trial in Texas, Beck's frequent media appearances have focused on her reaction to the Yates case, and her determination to educate the public about postpartum mood disorders.

Although postpartum depression is experienced by 10-15% of new mothers in the United States each year, it has been difficult to detect, and is not regularly checked for in postpartum visits. Beck received a big boost when Governor John Rowland's administration recommended that the *PDSS* be distributed to all appropriate health care personnel in the state. It was after several

# he PDSS consists of 35 questions, written at third-grade level, that can be answered in 5 to 10 minutes. To target existing symptoms and risk factors, the questionnaire is broken into seven categories associated specifically with postpartum depression:sleeping and eating disorders, anxiety and insecurity, lack of control over emotions, cognitive impairment, loss of self, guilt and shame, and contemplating harming oneself.

tragedies involving women with perinatal mood disorders and their children that the Governor asked Jodi Rell, Lieutenant Governor, to create the Maternal Depression Working Group. The group hopes to see special attention given to maternal depression in a major public education campaign launched to de-stigmatize mental illness. In her report to the Governor, Rell suggested that the Beck and Gable survey "may become the most important tool in assessing and treating the mood disorder." Currently, the *PDSS* is being translated into Spanish and German, and Connecticut and Indiana are two states seriously discussing a strategic widespread implementation of the scale.

Beck's research program focusing on postpartum mood disorders is incredibly multifaceted. She is now into her third year of a three year Donaghue Medical Research Foundation grant entitled *Screening Hispanic Mothers for Postpartum Depression*. Along with Henrietta Bernal,PhD, and Robin Froman, PhD, she has been involved for the last two years in translating the English version of the *PDSS* into a standard Spanish version. Beck has been using two clinical sites to assess the psychometrics of this Spanish version. One site is in the Hartford area and the second is in Galveston, Texas.

Currently, with the statistical help of Gable and Joseph Sheehan, PhD, the data from year two of the grant are being analyzed. In this third and final year of the grant, Beck will recruit 150 Hispanic mothers to complete the *PDSS-Spanish Version* and to undergo diagnostic psychiatric interviews to determine whether they are experiencing postpartum depression. The sensitivity and specificity of the *PDSS-Spanish Version* will be assessed and appropriate cutoff scores for major and minor postpartum depression will be determined for the *PDSS-Spanish Version*.

Beck is also conducting a phenomenological study of women's posttraumatic stress disorder after childbirth. Beck's sample of mothers suffering from this disorder comes from New Zealand. This research is a result of partnerships Beck formed when delivering keynote presentations in New Zealand and Australia last year. Beck's research program has taken her around the world helping to educate the public and health practitioners about postpartum depression and other postpartum mood disorders.

It is apparent that our nation and the world are more seriously investigating the biochemical and psychosocial aspects of the illnesses, as well as the potentially tragic effects postpartum mood disorders can have on families. Undoubtedly, individual sufferers, the media, and fellow researchers will now reference Beck's *Postpartum Depression Screening Scale*. Beck continues to seek funding for further research to help reduce risks, save lives, and address the complexity of perinatal mood disorders affecting so many women and their families.

# It's all about Relationship

Regina Cusson, PhD, RNC, NNP, is the

UConn site director for the Program for Health Care Relationships (HCR), a \$2.8 million initiative funded by the Donaghue Foundation and based at Yale University School of Nursing. HCR aims to understand how clinician/patient relationships affect patient adherence, and how well patients follow instructions about such matters as taking medication and making lifestyle changes. Eleven Connecticut researchers, two from the UConn School of Nursing (Anderson and McDonald), have been named to receive a total of \$750,000 as part of the HCR. "The Donaghue Foundation is focused on promoting practical benefit to human life. The best science is of no use in promoting health if human relationship problems impede its effective delivery to patients. The health care relationships program is a great opportunity to understand and eliminate barriers to care and benefit patients," said Ray Andrews, Donaghue Foundation Trustee.

During the 42-month long project, the team of researchers hopes to develop a science of healthcare relationships. They see the potential for improving health care through understanding of its relational aspects as expansive. "We're excited to further our understanding of collaborative relationships and to contribute to Connecticut's health by working together to make patient care everything it can be," said Dean Dzurec of the UConn School of Nursing.

Cusson, a co-investigator on the National Institute of Child Health and Human

Development grant Adult Attachment & Intervention Efficacy with Preterms, will also evaluate the effectiveness of a videotape she developed called "Premie Talk: Understanding Premature Baby's Behavior". Because premature birth is a major cause of developmental delay for children in the U.S., this randomized clinical trial aims to help understand why early intervention does not affect all parents and preterms in the same way and to the same degree. Cusson's video is key to the intervention since the need remains for cost-effective, replicable methods to promote development in preterm children.

Cusson is one of five investigators working on this \$2.2 million grant funded by the NICHD through June of 2006. Based at the University of Maryland, this study will evaluate the effectiveness of facilitating parent-child interaction, infant physical development, mental and motor development, and socio-emotional development. Additional factors being investigated are mothers' and fathers' parental adjustment and sensitivity to the infant during the first two years postpartum.

# Enhancing Kangaroo Care Education

How can we better educate undergraduate nursing students about KangarooCare (KC), a beneficial nursing intervention that brings parents and their preterm, diaper-clad babies skin-to-skin, and chest-to-chest?

Through a nationwide web-based survey, Art Engler, DNSc, RNC, CRNP and Karalyn Jacobs '02, honors graduate are assessing nursing students' level of knowledge about KC. Engler and Jacobs seek to improve KC nursing education and enhance KC use in the care of preterm infants and their families.

KC's benefits for preterm infants include improved weight gain, earlier weaning from oxygen, and shorter hospital lengths of stay. Benefits exist for the parents, too. Engler's quantitative study Kangaroo Care and Maternal Stress: Physiological and Psychological Effects suggests potentially lower levels of maternal stress in mothers who deliver KC to their babies.

# Pharmacology Research: Ongoing, Online CEU, and On-A-Roll

Patricia Neafsey's current research program, Preventing Drug Interactions in Active Older Adults, continues to win accolades as it innovatively informs older adults about drug interactions. Through interactive multimedia, the Personal Education Program (PEP) uses touchscreenequipped laptops to increase older adults' knowledge of potential drug interactions, to increase their ability to avoid drug interactions, and to reduce their adverse self-medication behaviors. In this final year of funding by the Patrick and Catherine Weldon Donaghue Medical Research Foundation, Neafsey plans to complete data collection from sites where the PEP has been in use.

Neafsey and visual communications designer Zoe Strickler's newly revised PEP software, *Avoiding Medicine Conflicts*, builds upon the success of the first software program created specifically to accommodate the learning styles and psychomotor skills of older adults. In fall 2001, Carolyn Pennington, Health Reporter for NBC30

News, featured Neafsey, Di Raymond '02, and clients at the Windsor Senior Center who participated in the program. PEP is now available in senior centers across CT. It contains 80 minutes of animation and interactive questions about blood pressure medicines, blood thinners, antacids and acid reducers, and pain relievers. It has even been called "Infotainment" due to its user-friendly, informational and enlightening qualities.

Neafsey and Strickler have founded the

UConn Center for Health Communication
Research and Design at the School of Nursing.
Collaborating with faculty in Communication
Sciences and Computer Science at both
UConn and Eastern Connecticut State
University, they aim to design and test a
computer interface by which older adults can
enter data concerning their self-medication
practices. Software will be housed on the
next generation touchscreen integrated
wireless computers called "tablet PCs".
Less than 3 pounds in weight and about
the size of a sheet of paper, they are very
easy for older adults to use.

Building on the success of her previous online continuing education programs,
Neafsey is now offering *Pharmacokinetics Primer Online 2002.* This interactive multimedia ten hour program journeys through the human body to examine how the body interacts with medicines taken orally. # New Faculty

I joined the faculty at the University of Connecticut in August 2001, coming from Florida
Atlantic University. I temporarily assumed the
Graduate Program Coordinator position for
the spring semester. (I enjoyed the mild winter!)

I earned a BS in nursing from Northern Illinois University in 1974 and worked in Neonatal Intensive Care following graduation. But in 1978 when I took a teaching position in Chicago at a diploma school of nursing, I truly found my niche. I earned my MS from Northern Illinois University in 1981; and a doctorate from SUNY Buffalo examining the lived experience of having a liver transplant.

Next, I took an Assistant Professor position at Case Western Reserve University, Frances Payne Bolton School of Nursing in Cleveland where I taught and completed my Adult Nurse Practitioner and Family Nurse Practitioner certificates. My research focuses on life transitions and lifestyle changes including the experience of menopause in women ages 45-100. My work on experience with menopause contrasts knowledge from lay and medical literature.





In 2001, *Elizabeth Anderson, PhD, APRN*, (above) and Deb McDonald (below) were both funded by grants from The Program for Health Care Relationship (Patrick and Catherine Weldon Donaghue Medical Research Foundation, Yale University & University of Connecticut Schools of Nursing). Anderson's study, *Exploration of the effect of nausea, self-efficacy, and health care relationships on medication adherence in AIDS patients*, seeks to reduce nausea, enhance quality of life, and improve medication adherence for persons with AIDS.



Deb McDonald, PhD, RN,'s study, Assisting elders to communicate their pain after surgery, uses a 15-minute video to teach techniques for dealing with pain and pain medication. The video shows actual patients and healthcare providers in the hospital setting. If using the video significantly decreases pain for elders, it will be made available to hospitals, nurse practitioners, physicians and others.

# Center for Nursing Research: "Thinking Allowed..."

Research stays a top priority and a foundational experience at the School and at the Center for Nursing Research (CNR). The Center supports, sustains, and encourages nurse investigators as they encounter the challenges of research. Thanks to Pat Neafsey, PhD, who acted as Interim Director of the CNR in fall 2001 when I was on sabbatical.

Our PhD students historically participate in the Eastern Nursing Research Society, head-quarted at UConn; and annual conferences, such as the 14th Scientific Sessions of ENRS. # Where the Past is Present

An Ongoing Legacy

ould you know how to make a flaxseed poultice, or even know what it is or why a nurse would prepare one? Did you know that, until the late 18th century, babies were often fed from pewter nursing bottles? The deadly effect of the lead in the pewter was unknown then and no doubt added to the already high infant mortality rate of the era.

If you don't know the answers to those questions, or the definitions of historical terms like minim, drachm, and scultetus binder, why not treat yourself to the wonders of past nursing practice by visiting the Josephine A. Dolan Collection at the University of Connecticut School of Nursing?

**From a gallery of artwork that surrounds the room**, to mannequins dressed in nursing school and military uniforms, and permanent and rotating exhibits of nursing artifacts, the unprecedented collection transports viewers back in time, placing them at their professional ancestors' sides. The multitude of caregiving skills, as well as the nurses' knowledge and ingenuity to carry them out, are revealed. The collection stands as silent, provocative evidence of nurses' continuing contributions to human welfare. Simultaneously, one becomes aware of the enormous impact that science, technology, societal norms and education have had on the changing art of nursing practice.

The exhibition is anchored by two permanent displays. One focuses on the Nightingale era and features an adjustable Crosby bed (circa 1877) specially designed with underlying movable canvas straps to provide the greatest comfort possible for long-term bedridden patients. Nearby is a late 1800s wicker wheelchair that could be self-propelled or pushed, and a wooden walker that quite possibly was the prototype for current models. Also included in the display is an 1800s wooden "baby-tender" that confined a curious toddler in a stationary cage-like frame. Burning fireplaces, open water wells and stray animals were always potential hazards for untended young children of the time period. Other devices affecting mobility may evoke more private thoughts and feelings. A single crutch from the Civil War period once carried an amputated leg stump on a small leather platform. A pair of 36-inch axillary crutches with shoulder rests padded in red velvet

mannequin on which students practiced the fundamental skills of nursing, lies in an iron bedstead awaiting a treatment that required the use of the adjacent fully equipped dressing carriage. "Baby Chase" is not far away in a typical hospital bassinet of the era. In the background the pendulum of a ticking wall clock gently

reminds one of movements in time.

Rotating exhibits of artifacts drawn from the extensive collection are periodically presented in thematic displays with accompanying textual data. Among those featured have been medication devices (e.g., syringes, chests, advertisements, containers), feeding apparatus

(e.g., pap boats, invalid feeders, baby bottles), World War I and II memorabilia (e.g., nurses' medals, Red Cross paraphernalia, recruitment posters), and Connecticut nurses' caps and pins. Other displays have paid tribute to nurse leaders such as Florence Nightingale, Virginia Henderson, and Josephine Dolan.

Collectively, the exhibits imprint the viewer with the truth that nursing history is not simply incidental to current nursing practice. It is the basis upon which present-day practice was built and is the foundation for the profession's future growth and development.

The major portion of the collection, which was assembled over a 50-year period, was donated by Dr. Josephine A. Dolan, a professor of nursing at UConn for more than 35 years. She had the wisdom to preserve the history of the profession for the

enlightenment of the present and the future.

The collection is located in Storrs Hall, at the University of **Connecticut in Storrs**. Henrietta Bernal `68, PhD,

Henrietta Bernal, former

coordinator of the community

health nursing track at the UConn School of Nursing, received the Beverly Koerner Outstanding Alumni Award for Education in Nursing. Bernal has had joint appointments with the Departments of Anthropology and Community Medicine for more than a decade, and has served as a resident faculty member for the Center for International Community Health Studies.

Bernal's scholarly work includes numerous publications, presentations, and consultancies largely focused on diabetes in the Hispanic population, and health/illness behavior among ethnic populations. She serves on the editorial board of the Public Health Nursing Journal. Her research has been funded by the Harford Foundation for Public Giving, Soros Foundation, the State of CT Department of Health Services, and the Center for International Community Medicine. Her recent work supports publication of the Cultural Self - Efficacy Scale. Bernal is distinguished for

the award-winning CareLink program, co-initiated with Elizabeth Fumiatti, a UConn alumna and former Director of the VNA of Central Connecticut. CareLink, a partnership between UConn and the VNA of Central CT, is based on the Anderson and McFarland model, *Community as Partner*. Community links have been developed with churches, senior centers, high schools,

family service agencies, and assisted living facilities. The Connecticut Association for Home Care, Inc. recognized CareLink with the Outstanding Leadership and Creative Community Program Award in 1999. Since 1997, CareLink has provided over .3 million dollars of free care to more than 300 elderly in New Britain, CT.

Only two years after completing her baccalaureate degree she earned commendations for contributions to nursing practice and Nurse of the Year Award (1980) from the National Institutes of Health. Resnick is a prolific writer, researcher and educator who maintains a clinical practice as a geriatric nurse practitioner and is principal investigator for a 1.9 million dollar grant from the National Institute of Aging entitled, Testing the Effectiveness of the Exercise Plus Program Following Hip Fracture. She is also principle investigator on a variety of projects focusing on

health promotion activities of older adults living in continuing care retirement communities, on outcomes of restorative care programs, and on care of older adults in long-term care facilities. Currently, Resnick has over 50 articles published in nursing and/or medical journals, and numerous chapters in nursing textbooks related to care of the older adult.

Currently an Associate

Professor at U. of Maryland

School of Nursing, Department of Adult Health, Resnick has been instrumental in changing the paradigm of care of older adults from a focus on providing total care to a focus on motivating older adults to obtain and maintain their highest level of health and function. The model of motivation she developed, measurement tools associated with it, and interventions have been widely published and presented nationally at conferences and workshops.

Resnick is also a recognized leader in advanced practice nursing through her work as a member of the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners, chair of the AANP education committee, editor of the AANP Newsletter, and as the nurse practitioner on the Advisory Board of Nurses Service Organization. Resnick is involved in countless professional organizations, activities and services. Resnick was invited to

# Jane Murdock, EdD, MS, RN, Associate Professor Emerita,

received the University of

Connecticut School of Nursing Distinguished Service Award. Since the early 1970s, Murdock has been recognized as a leader in nursing education in Connecticut. Her research and scholarly work have been dedicated to developing knowledge and understanding the characteristics of adult and RN students, and to studying ways to enhance the educational environment to support their learning. In this time of severe nursing shortage, Murdock's groundwork will contribute significantly to the quality of ongoing efforts to stem the nursing shortage.

Currently, Murdock is Vice President of the Connecticut League for Nursing and President of the Nursing Career Center of Connecticut (NCCC). Murdock wrote the Helene Fuld Health Trust Grant that provided initial funding of NCCC, and, as one of the incorporators of the Center, she promotes its three major goals: recruitment of new nurses, enhancing career satisfaction and retention of practicing nurses, and facilitating career advancement for nurses. The Center has already made significant contributions to the State and UConn's efforts to recruit nursing students.

Without doubt, Murdock's public and behind the scenes efforts have helped create a framework for statewide nursing education that fosters and inspires nurses to seek advanced education. Continuing education for nurses and the contribution of that education to stemming the nursing shortage is well-documented. Through Murdock's efforts, a strong foundation has been laid here to support the recruitment and retention of Registered Nurses in Connecticut.

The University of Connecticut, is tremendously appreciative for all that Murdock has done for the nursing community and our School.




