

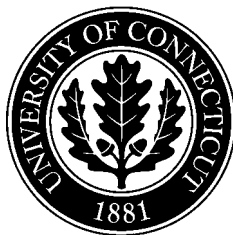

Mission

Founded in 1881, the University of Connecticut serves as the flagship for higher education and the primary doctoral degree granting public institution in the state. The University serves as a center for research, dedicated to excellence in higher education and fulfillment of its land grant status. It is committed to meeting the educational needs of its undergraduate, graduate, professional and continuing education students and providing the faculty with the means to develop their intellectual capacity through teaching, research and interaction with society. Through the integration of teaching, research and service, the University provides an outstanding educational experience for each student.

The University will serve the state and its citizens in a manner that enhances the social and economic well-being of its communities. It will do so by providing leadership in the pursuit and dissemination of knowledge to all its constituents, recognizing that the continual transmission of knowledge and lifelong learning are essential to Connecticut's future in a global context. It will seek to enhance the quality of life and the economic well-being of Connecticut.

Statutory Responsibilities

The General Statutes of the State of Connecticut and the Morrill Act of the U.S. Congress have charged the University of Connecticut with the responsibility for the education of Connecticut youth in scientific and classical studies, agriculture and mechanic arts and liberal and practical education. General Statutes have given it authority for programs leading to a wide variety of doctoral degrees and post-baccalaureate professional degrees. The University's constitutional mandate, "excellence in higher education," is accomplished in its traditional triad of academic responsibilities: teaching, research and service.

Significant Improvements & Achievements

National Recognition

The University received national recognition for the quality of its programs and accomplishments:

- The University was ranked 28th among the best public universities in the nation, up from 38th last year, according to U.S. News and World Report. UConn remains the top-rated New England public university. Since 1997, freshman enrollment has grown nearly 50 percent, minority freshman enrollment has grown 58 percent, average SAT scores have increased 28 points, and honors freshmen have increased 55%.
- The School of Dental Medicine was ranked first among the country's 55 dental schools. The ranking was based on student test scores on Part II of the National Board Dental Examinations. UConn dental students for more than a decade have consistently placed in the Top 10 on the National Examinations.
- The Health Center was cited as having one of the top hospitals in the country in America's Best Hospitals. The Health Center was ranked 36th, just below Cook County Hospital in Chicago and above institutions such as the University Medical Center of Tucson, Arizona, and the University of North Carolina Hospitals in Chapel Hill.
- Thirty-nine physicians with the Health Center, representing different medical specialties, were cited in the latest Best Doctors in America, based on a survey of nearly two million American doctors.
- The Geriatrics Program was named one of the country's Top 50 programs. The rankings included 17 medical specialties and a number of factors, including hospital-wide mortality ratio, discharge planning, technology services available for that specialty, and the ratio of nurses to beds.
- The Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, which helps premature infants overcome potential disabilities, became one of 10 elite training centers in the U.S. associated with an international Newborn Individualized Developmental Care and Assessment Program.
- The Alcohol Research Center is one of only 14 federally supported centers in the nation; the Clinical Chemosensory Research Center is one of only 5 in the country.
- The School of Business was named one of the best regional MBA programs in the country, according to a Forbes analysis of 50 of the nation's top business schools. Forbes ranked UConn 15th among regional MBA programs for providing a good return on investment for the MBA degree.
- The School of Business also was ranked 23rd of the Top 63 Techno-MBA programs in Computerworld. The ranking was due to the School's emphasis on Information Technology, a solid business curriculum, and real-world problem solving experiences.
- National rankings of the University's professional programs remained high. For example, according to U.S. News and World Report, the School of Law ranked 19th of all public law schools in the country, up from 20th last year. For the past two years the Elementary Education program ranked 19th nationwide, and Secondary Education ranked 23rd. The School of Engineering placed 58th out of the best 145 engineering programs in the country; its research national ranking was 41st.
- The Philosophy Department was one of only 32 programs worldwide to be recognized by Philosophical Gourmet for high ratings in a range of fields.
- The School Psychology Graduate Program received accreditation for the first time from the American Psychology Association. Only 52 School Psychology programs in the nation, and only two others in New England, are APA-accredited.
- The Ecology and Evolutionary Biology Graduate Program was given high marks by the National Association of Graduate-Professional Students. In an online survey with 32,000 responding students, the program received an overall satisfaction grade of "A," one of only a handful of "A's" given to programs in any discipline throughout the country.
- Nine UConn students (a record number) received offers of Fulbright Fellowships to study abroad or do research overseas. Seven faculty members also received Fulbright Awards.

- The women's basketball team had an undefeated season and won its third national NCAA championship. The men's basketball team reached the Final Eight before losing to the eventual NCAA champion in the East Regional Finals. The basketball teams, the men's and women's soccer teams, and the men's track and field team won Big East regular-season, tournament, or championship titles.
- The University's intercollegiate athletic programs were ranked in the Top 20 in the inaugural National Sports Honor Roll. When compared to 321 Division I colleges in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), UConn ranked in the top 10 percent of the colleges in gender equity, in the top 15 percent in school-to-school winning percentage, in the top 20 percent in number of sports offered, and in the top 35 percent in athletes' graduation rates.
- Moody's Investors Service upgraded the University's bond rating to Aa3, or "high grade," its second highest category. With the improved rating, revenue bonds issued to fund new construction will carry a lower interest rate. Moody's also upgraded the rating for the UConn Foundation.

Academic Programs and Instruction

In Fall 2001, 24,051 students were enrolled in degree credit programs in the 13 Schools and Colleges at the Storrs Campus, the regional campuses (Avery Point, Stamford, and Tri-Campus with locations in Torrington, Waterbury, and West Hartford), the Schools of Law and Social Work in Hartford, and the Schools of Medicine, Dental Medicine, and graduate programs at the Health Center in Farmington. Approximately 4,550 degrees were conferred in 2001-02 for completions of undergraduate, graduate, and professional programs at the University.

New professional master's degree programs in Applied Genomics, Applied Financial Mathematics, and Microbial Systems Analysis began preparing students with bachelor's degrees in the sciences, mathematics or engineering for careers in business and government and for work in fields such as genetics, pharmaceuticals, consulting, banking, insurance, research management and technology transfer. Applied Genomics, the first of the programs to be offered, is associated with a new Center of Applied Genetics and Technology and with more than 20 faculty members currently conducting genomics-related research and training, most within the Department of Molecular and Cell Biology.

Other new interdisciplinary programs include a master's program in Survey Research and an undergraduate major in Cognitive Science. A new Business minor offered undergraduates a package of skills to enhance job marketability and business acumen as they pursue degrees in fields outside the School of Business. A new Information Technology minor became available for non-computer engineering majors, particularly in traditional engineering programs, such as mechanical engineering, civil engineering, and electrical engineering.

Continuing Studies debuted an online post-baccalaureate certificate in Humanitarian Studies. The program prepares students for field and administrative positions that deal with refugee and displaced persons issues.

Federal funding of \$6.3 million supported Health Center training of pre-and post-doctoral students to become outstanding researchers, teachers, and clinicians in their fields.

UConn became the first "lifetime" member of the Organization for Tropical Studies, an international consortium with 64 member institutions in 7 countries on 4 continents. OTS offers field research opportunities in Costa Rica for faculty and students in ecology and evolutionary biology, natural resources management and engineering, plant science, animal science, geology and geography.

Web-based instruction increased in a wide range of disciplines, with some 800 courses using WebCT in incorporating class content, assignments, and interactive features to facilitate continued learning outside of the classroom. The M.S. Program in Accounting, nationally recognized for innovation in curriculum, moved toward on-line instruction for all of its courses. Thomas Terry, Molecular and Cell Biology associate professor, received the Connecticut Distance Learning Consortium/SNET Technology Innovation Award in Higher Education.

The new Business building promoted the University as a national leader in e-commerce education. It has been completely wired for laptops, with 1,800 computer plug-ins, including one at every seat in every classroom and one adjacent to every seat in the 120-seat study room/café. The new building also contains state-of-the-art video and recording rooms, several high tech laboratories, and a distance-learning classroom for worldwide transmission of information and courses.

Improved administrative operations benefited both students and faculty. A new information system streamlined business processes and offered online registration for classes, class enrollment management, and improved and more accessible information on academic records and courses. Admissions, financial aid and billing functions were planned additions to the system.

Four Health-Related Schools - Allied Health, Family Studies, Nursing, and Pharmacy - were restructured into a Division of Health and Human Development. The administrative reorganization increases efficiency and productivity by bundling similar administrative functions and follows a national trend of partnerships among the health fields.

The Honors Program was enhanced to better accommodate the increasing number of high achieving students. The First Year Experience, through courses, personal support, interactive online resources, and special living and learning experiences, helped first year and transfer students adjust to the University. Department of Residential Life began offering a web-based "study buddy" service for matching students interested in improving performance in specific classes.

Financial challenges at the Health Center continued to be addressed effectively through major organizational changes and focusing of resources while maintaining the quality and integrity of the educational, research and clinical programs.

The fall semester of 2001 was formally dedicated to human rights issues and included a series of lectures, programs, and conferences open to the University community and the public. The second annual comparative human rights conference in Storrs, "Education for Human Rights: Global Perspective," was sponsored by UConn in partnership with the African National Congress. A Diversity Week in the spring semester showcased the University's current cultural diversity programs and opportunities.

Fall 2001 minority undergraduate student enrollment at all campuses was 17%; graduate and professional minority enrollment was 12%. One hundred and ten countries were represented among the international students, who comprised 18% of the graduate and professional students. The Fall 2001 work force for all campuses included 15% minority faculty and 17% minority staff.

A Diversity Action Committee proposed wide-ranging goals to recruit and retain a more diverse workforce and to add scholarships, grants, and program enhancements for the improvement of the campus climate for minorities. The University Senate added a diversity content area to the new set of general requirements being developed for the undergraduate curriculum.

Five professors received UConn's highest-ranking honor, Board of Trustees Distinguished Professor: Yaakov Bar-Shalom, Electrical and Computer Engineering, one of the world's foremost authorities in target-tracking, a field with many commercial and defense-related applications; Richard D. Brown, History, one of the country's leading scholars of Revolutionary and Early National America and Director of UConn's new Humanities Institute; David A. Kenny, Psychology, one of the best known social psychologists in the United States and a national expert in interpersonal perception; Alexandros Makriyannis, Pharmaceutical Science, a leader in the field of drug discovery and medicinal chemistry and Director of UConn's Center for Drug Discovery; and William C. Stwalley, Physics, the world's leading authority on long-range interaction of atoms and a strong supporter of undergraduate research experiences.

Many other individual faculty members received state and national recognition for academic and scholarly achievements. Examples include: Deborah Muirhead, Art and Art History, a William Randolph Hurst Foundation Fellowship at the American Antiquarian Society; Bette Talvacchia, also Art and Art History, a Frese Senior Fellowship at the National Gallery and an Andrew W. Mellon Fellowship at the Metropolitan Museum of Art; Nancy Shoemaker, History, a financial award from the National Endowment for the Humanities for research on the history of American Indian involvement in whaling;

Richard Clark, Nutritional Sciences, a National Award for Excellence in College and University Teaching in the Food and Agricultural Sciences; Bruce Koeppen, School of Medicine dean of academic affairs, elected to the National Board of Medical Examiners, which sets policy for licensure to practice medicine in the United States; Paul Klemens, Physics, recognized for outstanding contributions to phonon physics at the International Conference on Phonon Scattering in Condensed Matter; and Richard Cole, Political Science, one of 15 faculty members in the country selected to attend the Supreme Court Historical Society's seminar for scholars of public law.

Research, Service and Clinical Care

This past year the University experienced significant research growth by strengthening research operations and enhancing research support. External awards for research, training and public service increased 9.8%, to \$86.6 million, at Storrs and the Regional Campuses, and increased 16.9%, to \$80.8 million, at the Health Center.

A new Fuel Cell Research Center provided leadership in energy development and was named a center of research excellence. With investments of \$14.5 million from various federal, private, and state partners, the Center incorporates a core research activity with six Endowed Engineering Professorships, a new state-of-the-art fuel cell building, and two recently donated major fuel cell power plants. Fuel cells hold promise for increasing the nation's reserve of sustainable, renewable energy resources.

Two other centers of research excellence received special support and encouragement from the University: the new Center for Regenerative Biology, located next to the recently completed Biotechnology Center; and Technology Transfer and Incubator space to bring to market inventions and discoveries made by researchers at the Storrs Campus and the Health Center.

Amy, the first farm animal in the U.S. cloned from non-reproductive cells, gave birth to a healthy 103-pound bull calf, "Fina-Lee." The normal birth of this calf, and three others born to each of Amy's 3 surviving clone sisters, adds to the mounting evidence that farmers may be able to create copies of champion milk-producing cows and animals that are particularly resistant to disease.

Faculty members in Allied Health Dietetics and Clinical Medicine's Center on Aging studied the potential of soy for building better bones. Their research combined the Dietetics expertise in examining dietary protein's effects on calcium and bone activity with the Clinical Medicine expertise in treating women with osteoporosis.

Civil and Environmental Engineering researchers developed new methods and tools for precise precipitation measurements and real-time rainfall estimation. Geography researchers worked with the state Department of Public Health to develop a map that tracks the risk of Lyme disease in Connecticut. The Geography Department also advanced the use of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) to analyze different types of diseases, disease clusters (unusual concentrations of health events) and locations of health care centers.

Molecular and Cell Biology faculty members discovered a three-dimensional structure of rhodopsin, a protein fundamentally responsible for vision. Rhodopsin has potential for the pharmaceutical industry in relating cell membrane proteins to biological signals. Pharmaceutical Science research included significant discoveries relating to brain self-repair for Alzheimer's patients.

Plant Science scientists genetically engineered a plant that thrives in slaty soil and can survive extended drought conditions. The work could assist developing countries in increasing food production through reclamation of farmland lost to salinization and lack of rainfall.

Research at the Health Center included the following: the discovery of a gene useful for identifying and preventing adult onset primary open-angle glaucoma, a leading cause of blindness; a study for the National Cancer Institute of how certain nutrients affect cancer development; and research on scleroderma, the overproduction of collagen in diseases affecting 300,000 Americans, with a five-year grant totaling nearly \$1.5 million from the National Institute of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal and Skin Disease. The Health Center was one of 11 academic institutions nationwide to receive funding from the

National Institutes of Health to improve health care for women and the quality of research in the field. Five scholars will use the \$2.5 million grant to study separate medical issues affecting women

Public service contributions by the Health Center focused on a wide range of Connecticut health issues. The School of Dental Medicine collaborated with University of New Haven and a managed care organization in a two-year pilot program to provide dental health services to medically indigent children. Medical and dental students organized a 5k race to raise funds for medical supplies for the South Park Inn, a Hartford Shelter for the homeless.

The Health Center also partnered with the Department of Correction to purchase an information system and two robots to automate dispensation of medicines in the state's prison system. The robots, which prepare and package prescriptions for inmates, save time and money and improve safety and security dispensing drugs in prison facilities. The project is expected to save \$200,000 a year in the cost of drugs and administration.

A new Surgery Center at the Health Center was planned to expand operating room services, meet the growing health care needs of the Farmington Valley, and link the Musculoskeletal Program research excellence with clinical excellence. A new diagnostic testing program, called pre-implantation genetic diagnosis (PGD), was developed to help couples identify genetic disorders and plan births of healthy babies. The Health Center also offered free screenings to help the public observe National Melanoma Screening Day, National Anxiety Disorders Screening Day, and National Stroke Awareness Month.

John Dempsey Hospital was awarded two prestigious Connecticut Quality Improvement Awards: one for the Interpreters for the Deaf Program and another for a rapid equipment availability initiative. These awards recognize excellence in managing quality improvement for success and growth. This past year the Hospital increased admissions by 14.2%, to 8,580; increased outpatient visits by 20.7%, to 167,766; and increased the average daily census 4.1%, to 147.3. The UConn Medical Group, including UConn Health Partners, increased volume by 29.3%, to 706,320 invoices issued in FY '02. John Dempsey Hospital continues to provide the only Emergency Department in the Farmington Valley.

Storrs and regional campuses also contributed to Connecticut's economy and quality of life. For example, the Neag School of Education, on behalf of a statewide education consortium, organized professional development programs for more than 1,600 superintendents and principals in Connecticut's public and private schools with the support of \$2 million from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Other University outreach activities for the state's schools included the da Vinci Project, sponsored by the School of Engineering, to help teachers in grades 7 through 12 integrate basic engineering concepts into their math and science classes. The Mentor Connection Program continued with another three-week summer program in many disciplines for talented high school juniors and seniors. A BioBus program, one of only three in the country, introduced Connecticut's middle and high school students to inquiry-based science experiments. The customized mobile laboratory, sponsored by the Health Center and the Storrs campus, promoted interest in the state's flourishing biotechnology and pharmaceutical industries.

The National Research Center on the Gifted and Talented continued to identify and serve high potential students with limited English proficiency, with disabilities, or from economically disadvantaged groups. Collaborative efforts involved 52 state Departments of Education, researchers at other universities, and 360 school districts throughout the country.

School of Law students provided service on a broad range of legal issues through the Criminal, Civil Rights, Mediation and Poverty Law and Tax Clinics and through the Center for Children's Advocacy and the Connecticut Urban Legal Institute.

School of Social Work provided leadership in helping Latino children find foster families in the Greater Hartford Region. The nearly \$1 million federal grant links academics, the clergy, and social workers in the effort to increase the number of Latino families involved in foster care and adoptions.

The Arts Outreach Program of the School of Fine Arts provided an impressive mix of more than 280 educational, cultural, and performance activities in over 80 cities and towns across Connecticut. Town Hall Concerts also were available to the state's communities, schools, and civic organizations.

The Colleges of Agriculture and Natural Resources and Liberal Arts and Sciences, all the Professional Schools, and the International Affairs Office also provided outreach, service, and professional continuing education activities at all the campuses. Continuing Studies enrolled nearly 50,000 participants in credit-free professional studies programs.

Facilities and Infrastructure

Continued progress in UCONN 2000, the \$1 billion, 10-year rebuilding program approved by the legislature in 1995, has resulted in the most extensive period of reconstruction in the University's history. Since 1995-96, \$812 million of projects have been authorized in bonds with state debt service commitment. An additional \$205 million in special obligation bonds have been authorized with net of refunded bonds to be repaid by the University from room/board and fee proceeds. Of \$595 million in construction-related contracts (exclusive of equipment), 83% of all funds have been contracted to Connecticut businesses.

Since the establishment of UCONN 2000, over 100 projects have been completed, including a new Chemistry building, a new downtown campus in Stamford, a new Marine Science building at Avery Point, a new Business School building, an expanded Fine Arts complex, a renovated Wilbur Cross building to serve as a one-stop-shopping center for student services, a new Agricultural Biotechnology building completed with an addition already underway, new residence and dining halls at Hilltop, South Campus, a renovated Northwest campus, an aggressive sprinkler and smoke alarm program that has made UConn dorms among the safest in the country, a new Dairy Bar, a new Visitors Center, new facilities for parking and for the UConn Co-op, a new ice rink, a revamped field house, a beautiful pedestrian campus core, new shuttle roadways, high-tech classroom and laboratory renovations, and state-of-the-art energy-efficient utility infrastructure. Currently under construction or in design are a center for undergraduate academic services, a renovated and expanded Student Union, an Information Technology engineering building, a new downtown campus in Waterbury, a new Pharmacy and Biology building, and another 1,200 beds in new residence halls and Greek Housing.

The new Husky Heritage Museum opened at Storrs, while construction of Rentschler Field in East Hartford, the University's new Division I football stadium, has been ahead of schedule. The stadium is scheduled to open in August 2003.

Several new initiatives were undertaken to strengthen the University's environmental performance, including the addition of an environmental manager, collaboration with the Town of Mansfield on the extension of the University's water system to residential neighborhoods northwest of the main campus, and consideration of the appropriate location for the University's less-than-90-day hazardous waste transfer facility.

The Energy Conservation Management Board awarded University President Philip E. Austin the 2001 Energy Conservation Award, commending UConn staff for "innovation in energy-efficiency initiatives."

Strategic Planning

A governor-initiated and bipartisan legislature-supported proposal for "21st Century UConn" included plans for a \$1.3 billion expansion and extension of UCONN 2000 through 2015. The proposal calls for more than 40 new construction projects, including new academic buildings and residences at the Storrs and regional campuses, the Health Center and the School of Law.

The University of Connecticut Foundation achieved two significant milestones. It raised more than \$50 million in a single year and launched a comprehensive Campaign UConn to raise \$300 million by the end of FY '04. As of May 2002, over 65% (\$196 million) of the campaign goal had been received. Endowment assets totaled \$205 million; total assets, including non-endowment funds, were \$253 million. In FY '02, the Foundation provided \$21 million to support programs and students at the University.

Three newly endowed chairs were established at the Health Center: the Janice and Rodney Reynolds Chair in Neurobiology, the UConn Orthodontic Alumni/Ravi Nanda Chair in Orthodontics, and

the Albert and Wilda Van Dusen Chair in Academic Medicine. Two new endowed chairs were created in the School of Business: the Robert Cizik Chair in Manufacturing and Technology Management and the GE Capital Professor of Business. Since the beginning of UCONN 2000, and with the state's provision for matching endowment gifts, the number of endowed faculty chairs has doubled, and now totals 51.

The University's general objectives for 2001-02 were achieved: 1) Enhancement of the University's already strong capacity to conduct internationally recognized scholarship and research; 2) Aggressive implementation of the fundraising campaign; 3) Completion of several major construction projects; 4) Efficient and effective use of current resources; and 5) Continued implementation of the Health Center's integrated Strategic Plan, with a particular emphasis on developing the four Signature Programs that build on existing clinical and research strength (cancer; brain and human behavior; musculoskeletal disease; and strengthening Connecticut health).

Future objectives, within a responsible operating budget, are: addition of faculty in key areas of student demand; improvement of undergraduate advisement; support and enhancement of diversity initiatives; addressing of needs in areas important to the research program; continuation of the enhancement of the regional campuses; and assurance of financial aid to students in need.

University plans for the future focus on the organization of resources to promote the continuing quality of its academic, research, service and, at the Health Center, clinical care programs. Planning efforts will include: organizational structure review; program capacity and utilization review; program quality review, including accreditations and assessments; and data gathering and analysis to inform resource allocation.

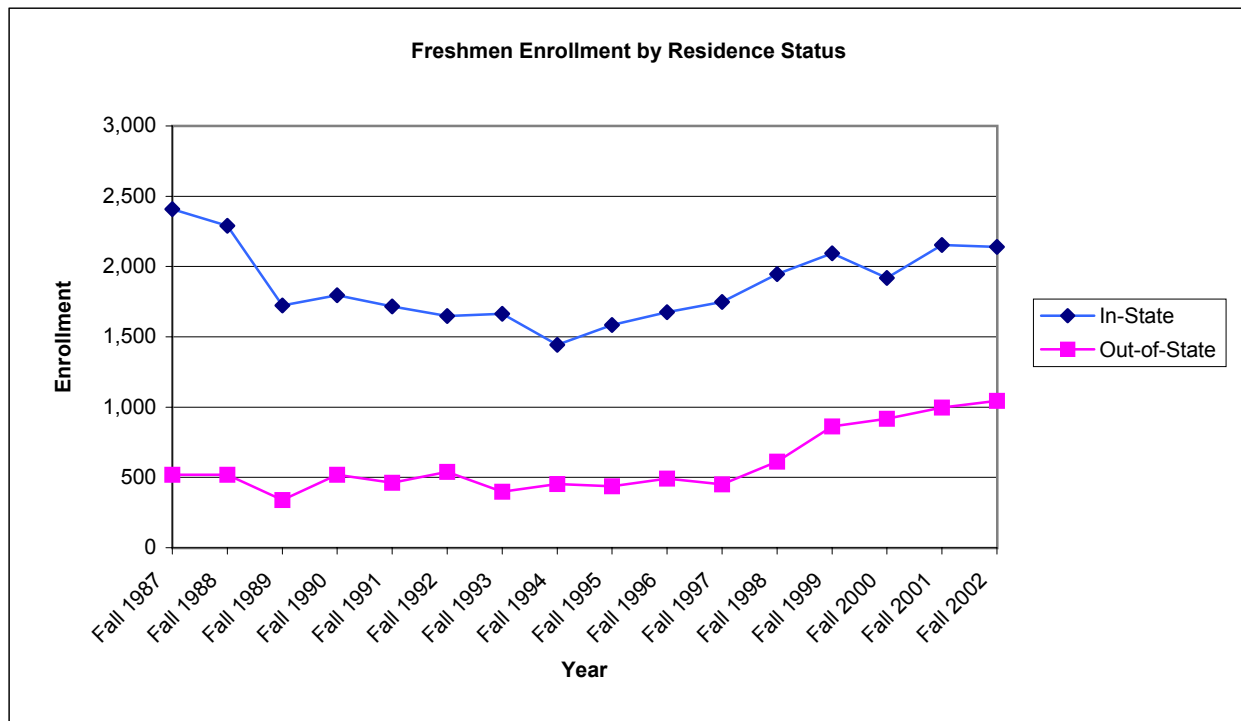

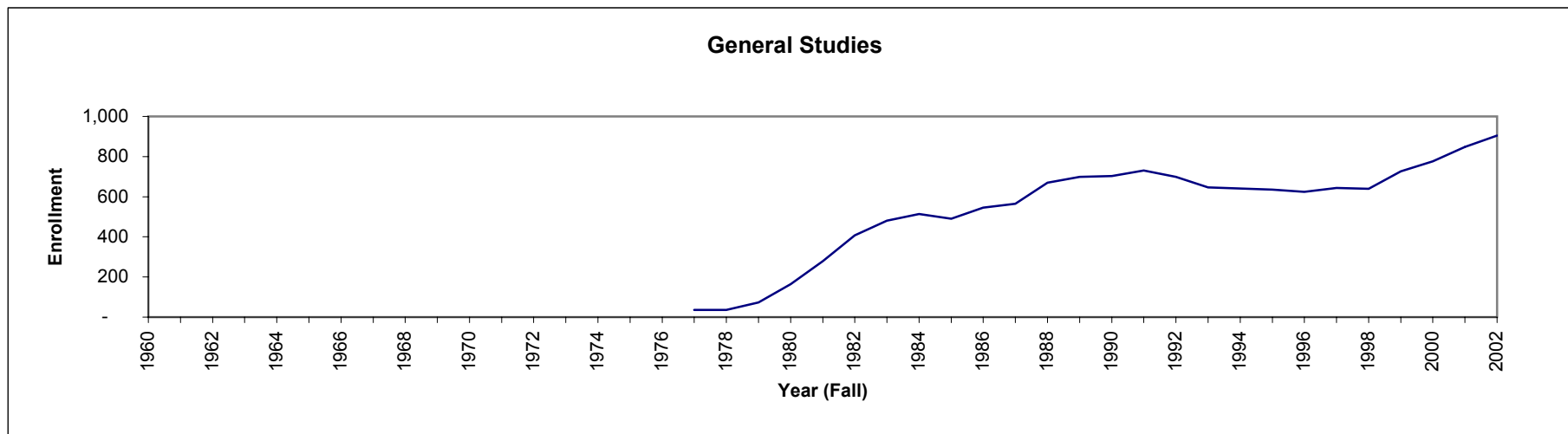

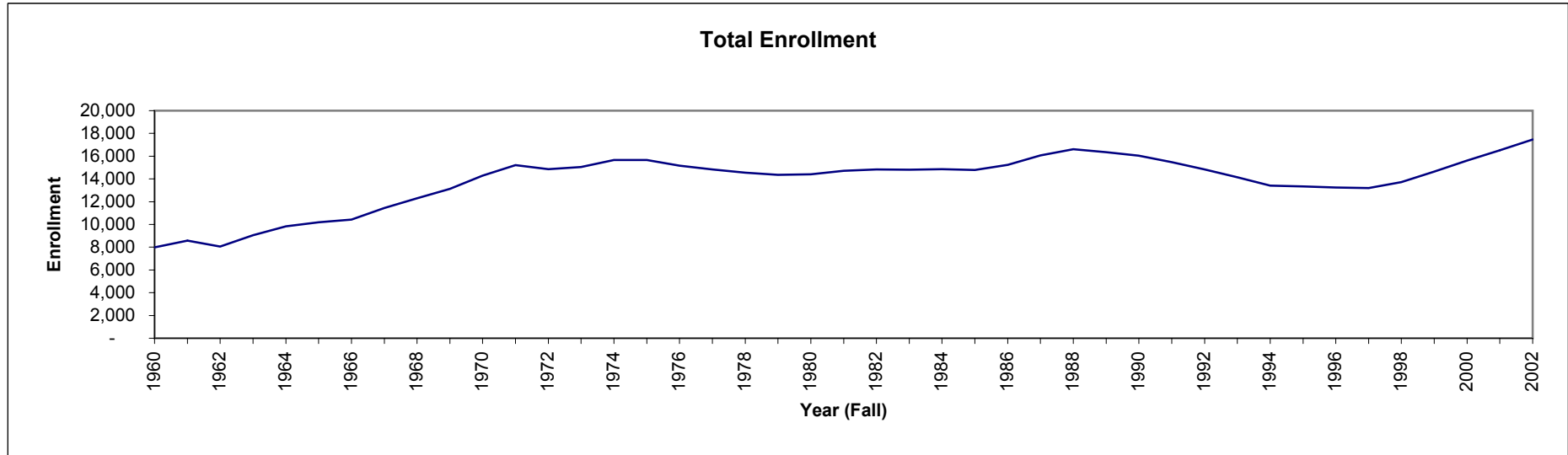

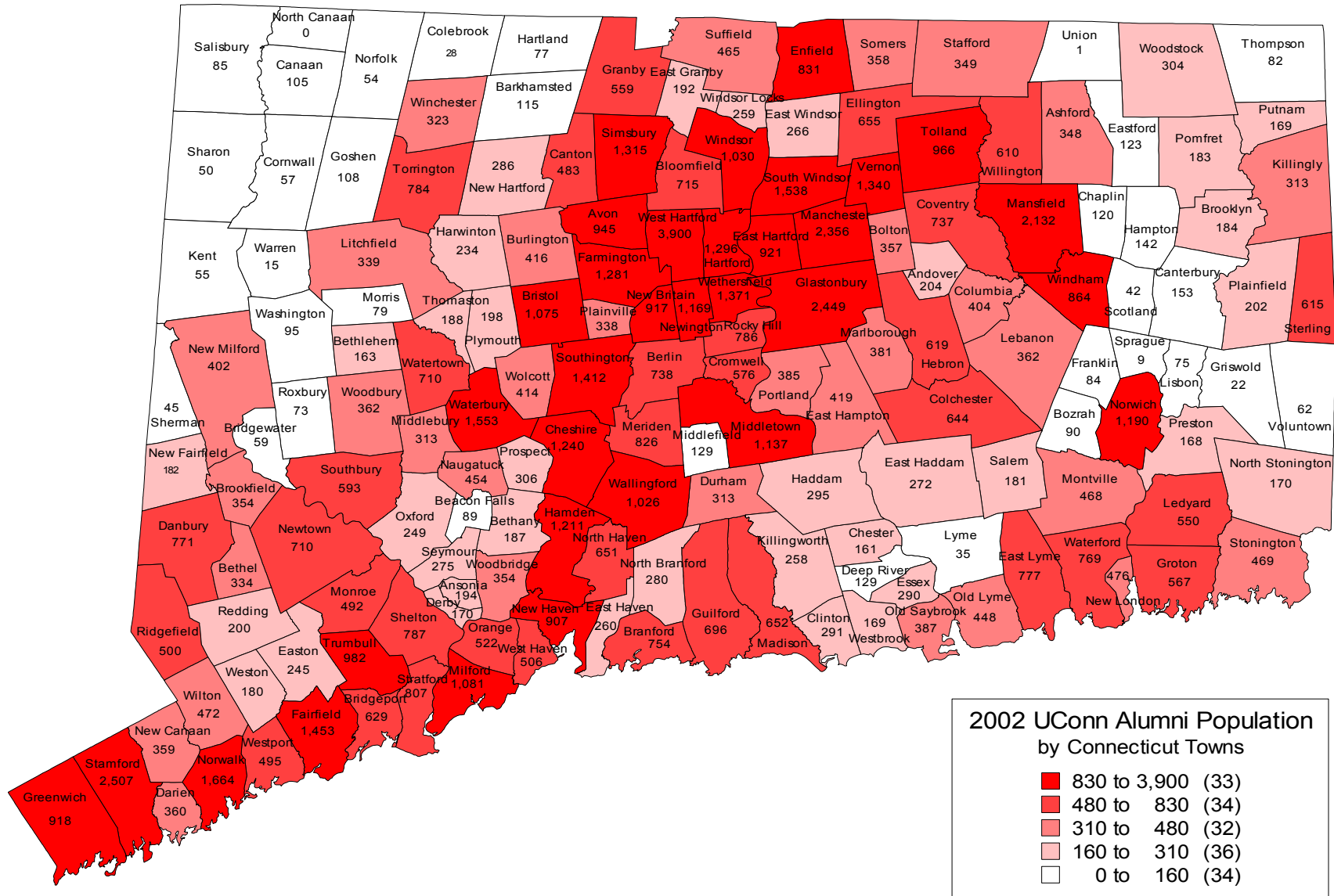

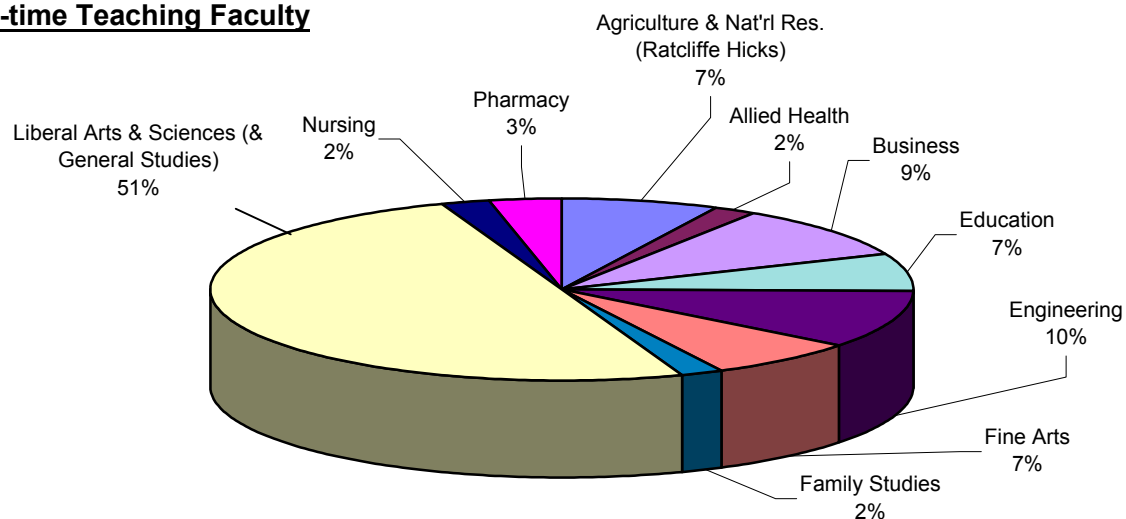
