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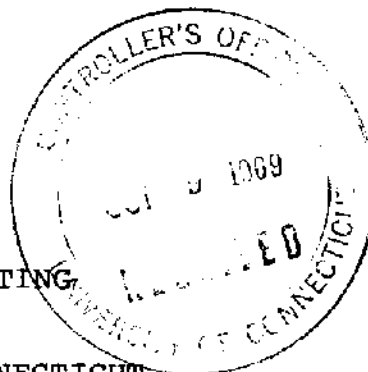
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MINUTES OF THE MEETING  
OF THE  
BOARD OF TRUSTEES  
THE UNIVERSITY OF CONNECTICUT

Held at Storrs, College of Agriculture

September 17, 1969



The meeting was called to order at 10:15 a.m. by Chairman John J. Budds. Board members present were: Messrs. Benton, Bishop, Budds Holt, Maxcy, Marcus, Tasker and Waller.

Also present were: Mr. Gant, Acting President and Mr. Evans, Vice President for Financial Affairs.

All actions taken at the meeting were by unanimous vote of Trustees present.

1. Mr. Budds expressed the greetings of the Trustees to the two new members of the Board - Mr. Walter Marcus, who fills the unexpired term of Mr. Alphonsus Donahue and Mr. Gordon W. Tasker, who replaces Mr. Alfred Fuller.
2. Upon introduction by Mr. Bishop, THE BOARD VOTED to adopt the following resolution relative to Mr. Alphonsus Donahue's services as a member of the Board of Trustees:

The Board of Trustees of The University of Connecticut at this, the September 1969 meeting of the Board, wishes to record its gratitude to Alphonsus J. Donahue, Jr. for his dedicated service and nautical contributions as a member of the University's Board of Trustees during the past twelve years.

In reserving the privilege of calling upon Al Donahue for his wise counsel in future years, the members of the Board herewith express their warm regards and extend to him their best wishes for the future.

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Mr. Bailey was asked to forward a copy of the Board resolution to Mr. Donahue.

3. Chairman Budds introduced Dr. Edwin Kersting, Dean of the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources, who in turn welcomed the Trustees to the College and briefly commented on the role of agriculture in the State's health and economy. He also introduced Dr. Robert G. Jensen, Professor of Dairy Manufacturing as a member of his faculty whose scientific work on lipids illustrates the research thrust of the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources.
4. THE BOARD VOTED to approve the minutes of the meeting of July 16, 1969 and to ratify all actions taken at the last meeting of the Board.
5. Acting on the recommendation by Mr. Holt, Chairman of the Finance Committee, THE BOARD VOTED to approve the following contracts and agreements and to authorize the President, Vice President for Financial Affairs, or Assistant Vice Presidents to sign the necessary documents on behalf of the University:

4. Agreement with Visiting Nurse Association of Hartford, Inc. for the School of Nursing.  
Amount: Total cost to University - \$60 per student; reimbursement of telephone charges.  
Effective Dates: July 31, 1969 - no ending date but reviewed annually.  
Purpose: To provide public health nursing field experience to students within the School of Nursing.

7. Agreement with Office du Tourisme Universitaire et Scolaire for the Department of Romance and Classical Languages.  
Amount: Total cost to University - \$9,115.  
Effective Dates: September 18, 1969 to October 29, 1969  
Purpose: For breakfast, lodging, excursions and orientation program for 36 students in the Junior Year in France Program.
8. Agreement with Faculte des Lettres et Sciences Humaines, University of Rouen, Mons. L. Harmand, for the Department of Romance and Classical Languages.  
Amount: Total cost to University - \$13,380.  
Effective Dates: November 1, 1969 to June 10, 1970  
Purpose: To provide office space, use of part-time secretary and course costs for students in the Junior Year in France Program.
9. Agreement with Reid Hall, Paris, France for the Department of Romance and Classical Languages.  
Amount: Total cost to University - \$2,700.  
Effective Dates: September 18, 1969 to October 29, 1969  
Purpose: To provide classroom and office space at Reid Hall and noon meals for 36 students in the Junior Year in France Program.
10. Cooperative agreement with Connecticut Board of Fisheries and Game for the Plant Science Department.  
Amount: \$5,000 to be paid to University.  
Effective Dates: August 1, 1969 to June 30, 1970.  
Purpose: To perform basic and applied research for the Board concerning problems of fisheries management of lakes, streams and estuaries under the direction of Walter R. Whitworth.
11. Agreement with the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith for the School of Education.  
Amount: Total cost to University - not to exceed \$29,033.  
Effective Dates: January 21, 1969 to June 30, 1970  
Purpose: For a state-wide program for "Meeting Urban Education Needs at the College-University Level" as authorized by U.S. Office of Education Grant No. OEG-0-9-164305-2297-725 (0-330-0401-170) under the direction of Mr. Walter Plotch, National Education Director of the

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Anti-Defamation League. This program is for an on-going, in-service training program for administrators and faculty members from all five public institutions of higher education in Connecticut responsible for the training of teachers.

12. Agreement with State of Connecticut Water Resources Commission for the Department of Civil Engineering.

Amount: To be paid to the University - an amount not to exceed \$1,800.

Effective Dates: September 17, 1969 to October 31, 1969

Purpose: To determine if the effluent discharged from the present City of New London pollution abatement facility to the Thames River reaches the area of the New London beaches and to determine a location for a regional facility to provide more protection to New London beaches and carry the effluent more directly to Long Island Sound.

13. To authorize Gene J. Barberet to issue and draw checks on behalf of the University of Connecticut for the Junior Year in France Program. Barclays, our depository in Paris, requires the following resolution authorizing them:

- a) To honor and comply with all checks, drafts, bills, promissory notes, acceptances, negotiable instruments and orders expressed to be drawn, accepted, made or given on behalf of this Company at any time or times whether the banking account or accounts of this Company are overdrawn by any payment thereof or in relation thereto, or are in credit or otherwise;
- b) To honor and comply with all instructions to deliver or dispose of any securities or documents or property held by the Bank on behalf of the Company.

Provided any such checks, drafts, bills, promissory notes, acceptances, negotiable instruments, orders and instructions are signed by the persons holding the undermentioned offices for the time being: The Director of the Program in France, Vice President for Financial Affairs, Assistant Vice President for Financial Affairs and Controller, and Assistant Controller.

- c) To treat all checks, drafts, bills, promissory notes, acceptances, negotiable instruments and orders, as being endorsed on behalf of the Company and to discount or otherwise deal with them provided such endorsements purport to be

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signed by the Director of the Program in France, Vice President for Financial Affairs, Assistant Vice President for Financial Affairs and Controller, and Assistant Controller.

14. An easement for the Hartford Electric Light Company to construct and maintain an underground electric distribution system on the Farmington site.
  15. An easement for the Algonquin Gas Company to construct and maintain a pipeline for the transmission of natural gas over land owned by the University southwest of Sullivan's Pond.
  16. The Board had authorized the President to negotiate the building of a new shopping center in the Dog Lane tract. Negotiations have now been completed to the point where the documents are ready for signature. This involves 30 acres of land at an annual lease rental of \$20,000. The lease will run for 50 years.
  17. Assignment of the University's interest in the invention of a prefabricated plastic filter drain by Professors Healy and Long to Research Corporation. Research Corporation will pursue the patenting and development of this invention in accordance with their standard agreement with the University dated November 1, 1954.
6. Subsequent to the discussion of the proposed shopping center in the Dog Lane tract and the annual lease rental of \$20,000, THE BOARD VOTED that Mr. Evans explore the possibility of placing the annual \$20,000 rental income in a separate fund for future land acquisitions. Mr. Evans agreed to report to the Board on this matter at a later date.
  7. Provost Gant reminded the Board of their proposed action in July to increase graduate assistant salary rates by \$150 for nine months for each of the three grades effective this 1969-70 academic year. This increase to include the legislative cost-of-living provisions. The Provost reported a favorable review by the Commission for Higher Education and THE BOARD VOTED to approve the above salary increases for graduate assistants.
  8. In compliance with Section 4 of Public Act 726, concerned with a Board of Governors for Higher Education centers, THE BOARD VOTED to designate the President of The University of Connecticut or his designee as the Board's representative to that body.

Provost Gant, reporting on September admissions, informed the Board that about 150 more new students than last year enrolled at the Storrs campus bringing the total number of freshman and transfer students up to 2,723. One, the Committee on Guidelines, has been established to define the University policy on basic freedoms and rights pertaining to the question of campus dissent. The other special committee, the Committee on Housing, will conduct a review and restudy of University housing policies.
13. Provost Gant informed the Board that the National Science Foundation has raised the ceiling on University expenditures of National Science Foundation awards to \$700,000 excluding certain auxiliary awards. The Provost also indicated that because of the uncertain financial situation at the National Institutes of Health, funding for individual projects may be reduced as much as 20 percent.
14. Provost Gant distributed to the Board copies of a draft statement, "Goals for Higher Education in Connecticut," describing two types of goals; those for the entire system of higher education, and those that are unique to the Commission for Higher Education. The Provost, urged the Trustees to review the draft statement and to forward their comments to his attention for a subsequent discussion.
