1. Agreement with Municipal Police Training Council, Meriden, CT.
Amount: \$23,000.00 (payable to University)
Effective Dates: September 13, 1982 - June 30, 1983
Program Director: M. Jane Cleare, Institute of Public Service
Purpose: To present a twenty (20)-day management course for police executives at a site and date mutually agreeable to the University and the Council. The University will provide program materials, graphic and printing of program announcement brochures, arrange for travel, housing and meals for all consultants and will absorb all costs involved in such agreements.

2. Agreement with Research Corporation, New York, New York
Amount: University of Connecticut's prior agreement with Research Corporation went into effect on November 1, 1954 and remains in effect with the acceptance by the University of this new agreement dated October 1, 1982. Income distribution will be completed on or about March 15 in each year and distributed as follows:
 1. Fifteen (15%) percent of Gross Income will be paid to the Foundation.
 2. From the remaining eighty-five (85%) percent of the Gross Income, Research Corporation will subtract the deductible expenses incurred during the preceding calendar year.
 3. If the subtraction produces a debit, it will be carried forward to be used in the following year's income distribution computation. If it produces a positive difference, fifty (50%) percent will be paid to the Foundation.Effective Dates: October 1, 1982 - indefinite
Program Director: Hugh Clark, Research Foundation
Purpose: The Research Foundation will assign or arrange for assignment to contractor of its right title and interest in and to inventions of members of the faculty, staff, fellows, associates, students and employees of the University and others covered by the University's Patent Policy, which the Foundation owns or is entitled to own or license to others. Research Corporation will evaluate all inventions submitted to it and will advise the Foundation of its decision to accept or reject such invention for administration. Research Corporation will file United States and foreign patent applications, maintain such patents, introduce inventions, patent applications and patents into public use, and secure a revenue from them.

3. Agreement with State of Connecticut Dept. of Mental Retardation, W. Hartford, CT.
Amount: \$12,797.00 (payable to University)
Effective Dates: September 13, 1982 - indefinite
Program Director: Tom Giolas, Communication Sciences
Purpose: University of Connecticut will provide the Mansfield Training School two graduate students in Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology to provide speech-language and hearing diagnostic and therapy services to clients of the School.
4. Agreement with Boiler Efficiency Institute, Auburn, AL
Amount: \$11,550.00 (payable to Contractor)
Effective Dates: July 22, 1982 - July 23, 1982
Program Director: John Farling, Office of Conferences & Institutes
Purpose: The purpose of this amendment is to designate the contractor as "Boiler Efficiency Institute," instead of "Auburn University, Boiler Efficiency Institute," and to change the maximum amount payable to contractor to \$11,550 from \$24,750. SUBJECT: AWARDS AND DONATIONS REPORT - AUGUST 31, 1982

RECOMMENDATION: That the Board of Trustees accept the Awards and Donations report for August 31, 1982.

BACKGROUND: Awards and Donations reported for the period ended August 31, 1982 totaled \$9,704,104. This represents a decline of 17.39% from the same period reported one year ago; however, in prior years we were able to report the receipt of awards from the Federal Government in support of Scholarship programs totaling approximately \$2.0 million. In 1983 we anticipate receiving approximately \$1.3 million of Federal Pell Grant and Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Funds: Pell Grant, \$1,091,000 and SEOG, \$181,000, respectively. These awards will be reported, therefore, in the time period received.

Research showed a decline of less than .24%. Scholarships and Fellowships showed the largest decline, 86.63%; however, as noted above, these figures are expected to change with the receipt of the 1983 awards. Traineeships declined by 20.79%; Educational Related projects increased by 46.42%; and, Unrestricted Gifts and Donations increased, 75.25%.

Federally sponsored program support declined by \$2.2 million, or 21%; State and Local Government support declined by \$177,257 or 83%; figures indicative of the impact of Reaganomics on the fabric of the Federal Government's extramural, research, training and service activity. These figures, however, do not incorporate anticipated funding after the October 1982 agency review and funding cycle. Once Federal fiscal year decisions for 1983 are made, these figures are expected to change accordingly.

Of the \$9.7 million received, \$3.7 million is attributable to activity at the Storrs Campus, while \$6 million relates to programs at the Health Center.

Projects funded in August of 1982 are indicative of the fine work the University's researchers and scholars are conducting, as well as their continued ability to effectively compete in an ever-increasingly competitive arena.

Some examples of awards received from the Public Health Service follow:

Dr. Philip Rosenberg of the School of Pharmacy for his project titled, "Properties of Chemical Modified Phospholipase A2" in the amount of \$110,107.

Dr. Enrico Mugnaini of the Biobehavioral Science Department for his project titled, "Organization and Development of Nervous Tissues," in the amount of \$83,477.

Dr. Donald Potter received his award in the amount of \$20,000 from the National Science Foundation, for his project titled, "Changes in Surface Microstructure of Superalloys Caused by Ion Implantation."

Other awards received are equally impressive, especially when viewed within the context of recent political events and budgetary recisions. As noted earlier, this trend may be expected to change once Federal fiscal year 1983 decisions are finalized.

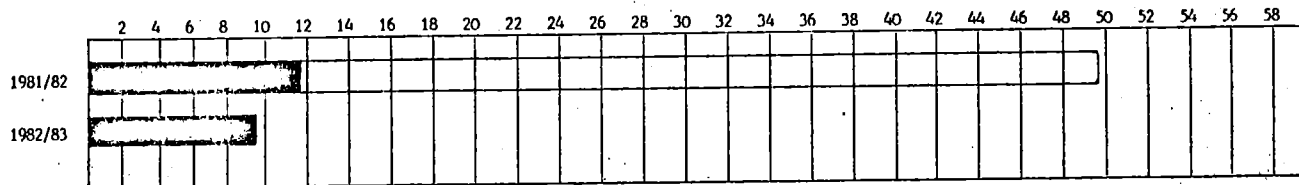

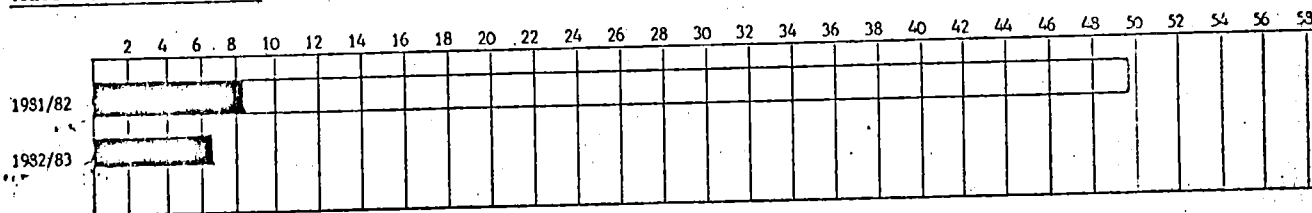

An interdisciplinary Doctor of Philosophy degree program in Marketing Communication is proposed in an attempt to meet market demands for scholars and researchers who have training in both marketing and communication theory and research, plus such related fields as advertising and media effects. The program is targeted toward established needs of both academic institutions and business.

The minimum general requirements for the degree in Marketing Communication will be:

- (1) A program of course work (66 credits above a B.A. or B.S.).
- (2) Demonstration of comprehensive knowledge by examination.
- (3) Demonstration of research/statistical/programming skills (through fluency in at least one computer language and one statistical package).
- (4) Ability to conduct independent research (obtained through a series of independent research projects carried out under faculty direction).
- (5) Original research upon which a dissertation is prepared.
- (6) An oral examination after completion of the dissertation, based upon the dissertation and related material.

The program in Marketing Communication will be an interdepartmental program drawing on the resources and faculties of the departments of Marketing and Communication Sciences. The proposed program builds upon courses in two graduate programs: the Master of Business Administration and the Master of Arts in Communication. To some extent, the presence of doctoral candidates is expected to enhance the quality of master's level

courses, especially those electives which tend to have relatively small enrollments. As with any doctoral program, students and faculty will share research interests and will work more closely together in the pursuit of scholarship than students enrolled in other programs. As a consequence, the majority of resources needed to support the program are the same as those already supporting faculty research.

The proposed degree is neither a marketing degree with a minor area in communication nor a communication degree with an emphasis in marketing. It is truly a joint program which is balanced between the two departments. The body of knowledge gained by the complementary nature of the curriculum is not available to any student in any existing program at the University, nor is such a program available at other universities. Because of the demand for graduates that are able researchers, both in the commercial and academic settings, the degree stresses research and research skills heavily. Students must show the ability to carry out both independent and original research.

1. PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

- 1a. An interdisciplinary Doctor of Philosophy degree program in Marketing Communication is proposed in an attempt to meet market demands for scholars and researchers who have training in both marketing and communication theory and research, plus such related fields as advertising and media effects. The proposed program will integrate doctoral coursework with existing master's degree courses.
- 1b. The program is targeted toward established needs of both academic institutions and business (see Appendix A). At present, there is no program jointly sponsored by a Business school and a Communications department in the United States. There are doctoral programs in Advertising at the University of Wisconsin and at Michigan State University, but these programs do not have the breadth of the proposed program and they are graduating students at a rate far below demand.

2. ADMINISTRATION

- 2a. The program plans were developed starting in 1978. They were approved by the faculties of Communication Sciences and of Marketing in 1980 and by the Graduate School in May, 1981.
- 2b. Dr. Subhash Jain (Marketing Department Head) and Dr. Thomas Giolas (Communication Sciences Department Head) will be jointly responsible for the administration of the program and supervision of its faculty.
- 2c. There are no regional or national accrediting bodies for this interdisciplinary doctorate. The master's degree program of the School of Business Administration is accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business which does not accredit doctoral programs.

3. FINANCE

- 3a. The program is designed to be self supporting. No request for additional financial support is made to the University for the proposed program. The program will involve a reduction in the number of elective undergraduate offerings. To a great extent, faculty resources devoted to training a small number of doctoral students will be offset by the assistance these students will be able to provide in helping with the teaching of undergraduate courses.

Additionally, incremental resources which will be needed for research and teaching fellowships will be raised from the business community. Some of these funds will be awards to support specific research projects or to obtain technical assistance from doctoral students and faculty. Doctoral students will receive an opportunity to participate directly in practical research applications as a consequence of these awards. In the past year, the Marketing Department has received over \$20,000 in research awards and gifts from private enterprise (see Appendix B).

If efforts to raise funds from external sources fail, the program could still survive with only two to three students enrolled.

5. CURRICULA AND INSTRUCTION

5a1. The following are the courses that will be required of a student entering the program with a Bachelor's degree in either Business or in Behavioral Sciences.

I. RESEARCH METHODS (15 CREDITS)

COMS 302 - Communication Research--Theory and Design
(Research design, descriptive and inferential statistics).

COMS 306 - Communication Methods (Experimental and survey design and procedures, multivariate statistics).

COMS 325 - Communication Theories and Models (Theory construction and introduction to modelling).

*MKTG 4X1 - Ph.D. Seminar in Research Methods (Multivariate methods with marketing research applications).

*MC 4X2 - Joint Marketing-Communication Ph.D. Seminar in Modelling.

*New courses.

II. FUNDAMENTALS (21 credits)

COMS 308 - Interpersonal Communication.

MKTG 315 - Introduction to Marketing Management.

COMS 309 - Mass Communication.

MKTG 320 - Marketing Planning in Corporate Strategy.

Each student will take 9 additional credits as follows:

(a) a student with an undergraduate degree in behavioral sciences (psychology, sociology, communication sciences) will take the following nine graduate credits in business: ACC 321 (Accounting Concepts), FIN 301 (Financial Management), and MORG 337 (Management and Organization).

(b) a student with an undergraduate degree in business will take nine graduate credits in the behavioral sciences to be approved by his/her committee; moreover, students with six undergraduate credits in marketing will take three graduate credits in business to be approved by the advisory committee to replace MKTG 315.

- (c) a student without an undergraduate degree in business or in the behavioral sciences will take nine to eighteen graduate credits to be approved by his/her committee, to gain exposure to fundamentals of both business and the behavioral sciences.

III. MARKETING/COMMUNICATION CONCEPTS (21 credits)

COMS 318 - Current Theory and Research in Persuasion.

COMS 371 - Seminar in Mass Communication Research.

*COMS 4X3 - Ph.D. Seminar in Audience and Applied Communication Research.

MKTG 340 - Marketing Communications Strategy.

MKTG 370 - Theory in Marketing.

*MKTG 4X4 - Ph.D. Seminar in Buyer Behavior.

*MC 4X5 - Joint Marketing-Communication "Capstone" Ph.D. Seminar. (This will be team-taught by members of both faculties and by guests from other universities and/or industries. It will focus on the research interests of each faculty member or guest).

*New courses.

IV. ELECTIVES (9 credits)

A student will take 9 credits in a minor area to be approved by his/her advisory committee. Potential minor areas are: (a) Behavioral Sciences, (b) Quantitative Methods and Statistics, (c) Economics, and (d) Business. The purpose of this minor is to provide the student with an opportunity to develop one related area of specialization.

5a2. The 300 level courses in COMS and in MKTG mentioned above are already offered in the master's programs in Communications Sciences and Marketing, respectively. Five 400 levels courses will be added: MKTG 4X1, MC 4X2, COMS 4X3, MKTG 4X4, AND MC 4X5. These will be Ph.D. seminars. Each will be offered once every two years.

5a3. The required courses will be:
COMS 302, COMS 306, COMS 325, MKTG 4X1, MC 4X2, COMS 308,
MKTG 315, COMS 309, MKTG 320, COMS 318, COMS 371, COMS 4X3,
MKTG 340, MKTG 370, MKTG 4X4, MC 4X5.

Exemptions may be granted to students who have taken courses in accredited programs that cover substantially the same content as courses in this program.

Electives may be selected from related disciplines as indicated in IV of 5a1.

A minimum of 66 credits of coursework above the B.A. or B.S. level, plus dissertation credits, is required.

5b. A student who has equivalent courses, before entering the program may be exempted from some of the required courses. Individual exceptions will be decided by the student's advisory committee following guidelines established for students entering our present master's degree programs.

- 5c. (1) Clinic or field work are not normally part of doctoral work in Business Administration or Communication Sciences.
- (2) Qualified faculty for this program are already in place.
- (3) Work experience is not a specific requirement of the program; however, business organizations already supporting faculty research efforts have expressed an interest in providing practical experience for doctoral candidates. We plan to take advantage of these opportunities to the greatest extent possible.
- (4) Supervision and evaluation of students will follow applicable guidelines and regulations described in the Graduate Bulletin of the University of Connecticut.
- (5) Not applicable.
- (6) See (4) above.

6. Resource Centers and Libraries

6a. The students in the proposed program and the program faculty will mainly have access to two libraries: the main University library on the Storrs campus and the MBA library in Hartford. The current collection of these two libraries is more than adequate to support the needs of the proposed program. The level of services provided by these libraries, study space, professional assistance, and so forth, are adequate for the purposes of this program.

The program also will be supported by the Department of University Computing Services at Storrs. The computing resources are adequate for the needs of the program. Several members of the faculty are substantial users of computing and will be able to supplement the professional assistance available from Department of University Computing Services.

The presence of the Institute for Social Inquiry at Storrs provides an additional valuable source of software and staff services.

6b. About 100 periodicals in the area of marketing management and communication sciences, and about five thousand books in the above two areas will directly support the proposed program.

6c. The University of Connecticut library holds current and back issues of the major journals in Marketing and Communications. The recognized, leading journals held by the library include:

- (i) Journal of Marketing Research
- (ii) Journal of Applied Psychology
- (iii) Journal of Communications
- (iv) Management Science
- (v) Journal of Consumer Research
- (vi) Journal of Marketing
- (vii) Communication Research
- (viii) Public Opinion Quarterly

6d. No new learning material is planned to be added for the proposed program. However, as new journals are introduced in the field, it would become desirable to subscribe to them. For example, a new journal titled Marketing Science is planned to be introduced in 1982. We would subscribe to it. Because research-oriented, directly relevant journals are infrequently introduced, and since the cost of subscribing to such journals is small, no plans have been drawn to seek funds for them. It is expected the library's budget would provide enough flexibility to subscribe to a journal or two whenever it is needed.

7. Admission, Student Personnel, and Graduation Policies

7a. A committee of at least four faculty members, two from Communication Sciences and two from Marketing (including Philippe Cattin and James Watt), will be formed to select the most promising students from among the applicants. The major criteria will be: (a) GMAT and/or GRE scores, (b) grade point average, (c) recommendations, and (d) apparent professional potential as judged by work experience or other information supplied with the application.

A student in the program will have to select an advisory committee composed of three members. Each committee will have at least one member from the Marketing faculty and another from the Communication Sciences faculty. The only basic knowledge requirement is a research methods course, which includes descriptive and inferential statistics. In addition, differential and integral calculus is strongly recommended. Applicants' deficiencies must be made up in the first year of the program.

The minimum general requirements for the degree in Marketing Communication will be:

- (1) A program of course work (66 credits above a B.A. or B.S.).
- (2) Demonstration of comprehensive knowledge by examination.

- (3) Demonstration of research/statistical/programming skills (through fluency in at least one computer language and one statistical package).
- (4) Ability to carry out independent research (obtained through a series of independent research projects carried out under faculty direction).
- (5) Original research upon which a dissertation is prepared.
- (6) An oral examination after completion of the dissertation, based upon the dissertation and related material.

Translated into operational terms, this implies the following requirements:

- 1) A minimum of 66 credits of course work above the B.A. or B.S. level, plus dissertation credits, as explained in 5a3.
- 2) A general examination for admission to candidacy for the Ph.D. This examination will be given by the student's advisory committee after completion of all course work.
- 3) Successful completion of a series of independent research projects. These projects will be carried out in collaboration with faculty and concurrently with course work (see Appendix D). The results will be publishable research papers and articles.
- 4) A dissertation prepared from a proposal approved by the student's advisory committee.

Enclosed in Appendix D are ProForma Curriculum - Worksheets

- 7b. Academic and career counseling will be provided by the candidates' advisory committee, following established procedures and regulations appearing in the Graduate Bulletin of the University of Connecticut.
- 7c. Four full-time students per year. Part-time enrollments are not anticipated. Allowing for attrition and years in which fewer than four students matriculate, the maximum enrollment in the program is not expected to exceed 13 students.
8. Student and alumni records will be maintained following regulations and procedures of the Graduate School of the University of Connecticut.
9. The physical facilities should be adequate for the addition of the small number of students in the proposed program. Research facilities will be shared by the two departments. The additional students of this small program can be absorbed with only moderate effect, as a result of restructuring of the total offerings of the two departments. Overall, the new program will not have any adverse effect on the

existing programs.

Current research equipment is adequate. This small program, particularly in its start-up stages, should not place unacceptable strains on existing equipment or its availability.

Equipment needs of doctoral students are virtually identical to those required to support faculty scholarship. For the most part, doctoral candidates will be working with faculty members on projects of joint interest.

10. The program will be listed in the following catalogues and brochures:
 - (a) The Graduate Bulletin of the University of Connecticut
 - (b) School of Business Administration Graduate Programs Brochure, and
 - (c) Communications Sciences Graduate Office's Brochure.

Copies of these documents are submitted with this application. (Appendix E).

11. It is certified that the hiring and admissions practices of the proposed program would be in compliance with all applicable state and federal laws, regulations and orders. It is further certified that the program will be operated under the provisions of approved nondiscrimination plans including consideration for women and minorities and access for the handicapped.

12. Time Schedule and Authorizations

- 12a. No licensing or accreditation agency other than the Board of Higher Education is applicable to this program.
- 12b. Initial students entering the program with a master's degree in business or communications may complete this program in Spring 1985, because they would be exempted from some of the 66 required credits.

13. Educational Planning Statement

- 13a. The program in Marketing Communication will be an interdepartmental program drawing on the resources and faculties of the Departments of Marketing and Communication Sciences. The proposed program builds upon courses in two existing graduate programs: The Master of Business Administration and the Master of Arts in Communication. As with any doctoral program, students and faculty will share research interests and will work more closely together in the pursuit of scholarship than students enrolled in other programs. As a consequence, the majority of resources needed to support the program are the same as those already supporting faculty research.

- 13b. The proposed degree is neither a Marketing degree with a minor area in communication nor a Communication degree with an emphasis in marketing. It is truly a joint program which is balanced between the two departments. The body of knowledge gained by the complementary

nature of the curriculum is not available to any student in any existing program at the University, nor is such a program available at other universities. (See comments from scholars and researchers in Appendix A). Because of the demand for graduates that are able researchers, both in the commercial and academic settings, the degree stresses research and research skills heavily. Students must show the ability to carry out both independent and original research.

- 13c. Marketing Communication is an emerging area of study, possibly better recognized by the commercial community than by the academic. As organizations have realized the value of research in advertising, mass communication effects, audience and market analysis, and other areas which join communication and marketing, they have created a fairly large number of positions in marketing communication. At the middle and upper management level, these are often filled by Ph.D.'s. However, these Ph.D.'s are typically not trained specifically in marketing communication; rather, they are from other behavioral sciences or more traditional business school backgrounds. An informal review of Ph.D.'s in such positions who are known to the drafters of this proposal includes persons with Ph.D.'s in Marketing, Communication, Social Psychology, Educational Psychology, Sociology, Economics and Journalism. These persons are valuable to the organizations for their research knowledge, and possibly for their knowledge of either communication theory or marketing theory. However, each must go through an extensive period of "on-the-job training", in an attempt to retrain themselves in the areas in which they have had little previous experience. This process of self-education is often less than complete. It must be carried out with little or no guidance from persons outside the employing organization, and under time pressures from immediate job demands. A more systematic educational approach is clearly called for.

Graduates from the proposed program would have fewer such educational deficiencies to overcome. The program recognizes the necessity for persons who desire to carry out research in a commercial marketing communication position to have a strong knowledge of both communication and marketing theory, coupled with very strong research skills.

There is a very strong academic research component to marketing communication. Persons with interests in marketing communication are currently found on Communication faculties, Marketing faculties, and in schools of Journalism and Mass Communication. They publish research in journals devoted to communication research (e.g. Communication Research; Journalism Quarterly; Human Communication Research; Journal of Applied Communication Research; Public Opinion Quarterly), and in marketing research journals, such as The Journal of Marketing Research, The Journal of Consumer Research, and The Journal of Marketing.

Professional societies such as the American Association for Public Opinion Research (a branch of the World Association for Public Opinion Research, with several thousand U.S. members), American Marketing Association (27,000 members), the Association for Consumer Research

(1000 members), the International Communication Association (4000 members), and others provide an avenue for marketing communication researchers to present and comment on current research.

In summary, marketing communication is an established academic area manifesting itself in the form of strong areas of interest and research by faculty members in Marketing departments or departments of Communication (or both -- for example, the eminent researcher, Michael Ray, has an appointment to both the Communication and Marketing faculties at Stanford). It is a recognized area of professional practice in commercial organizations, as a scanning of the Sunday New York Times employment ads will testify. As a final indication, one might consider the destinations of two of the last three faculty members who left The University of Connecticut, Department of Communication Sciences faculty: one left to become research director and later president of a large advertising agency; the other joined the faculty of a Department of Marketing at a large university.

Given the recognition of marketing communication as a distinct specialty, and given the excellent job market for Ph.D.'s with complete training in marketing communication, it is surprising that a program such as the one proposed here has not been implemented as yet. The lack of any competing programs places the University of Connecticut in the position of being the first university to offer a research degree specifically in Marketing Communication. As indicated by the comments from academic and business leaders in marketing communication summarized in Appendix A, being the first in the market could be a very enviable position for the University.

- 13d. Several faculty members at other Connecticut institutions, and M.B.A. and M.A. in Communication students, have already shown interest in the program. Additional and appropriate promotion which will support the launching of the program (both within and outside of Connecticut) will increase the number of interested applicants. (See also Appendix A)

The program will seek to enroll four new students per year. Stable enrollments should be reached within four years. Long-term enrollments in the program are expected to fluctuate between 8 and 13 with a typical number of 11.

- 13e. The program will draw graduate and undergraduate students from colleges and universities in Connecticut and New England, as well as from other states and countries. It is expected that undergraduates and those holding M.A. or M.B.A. degrees in the following areas would be particularly interested in the Ph.D. program: Marketing, Advertising, Journalism, Public Relations, Communication, Business Administration, Psychology, Sociology and Economics. Professionals who desire additional training and skills for advancement would also be drawn to the Marketing Communication Ph.D. in order to keep abreast of the latest advances in both Marketing and Communication theory and research.

The following actions of the University Senate are recommendations for changes in the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees:

Laws, By-Laws, Rules of the Board of Trustees

1. Meeting of September 14, 1981, Item 6a, p. 2.

a. The University Senate; Committees. Art. X.G. (p. 9.)

In order to simplify and to standardize the process of filling vacancies in the Senate's elected committees, the Senate Executive Committee moved:

"Laws, By-Laws, Rules of the Board of Trustees be amended to provide that vacancies of one year or less in the Senate Executive Committee, the Committee of Three, and the Senate Nominating Committee be filled by the available candidate with the highest vote in the last previous election in the appropriate class and constituency."

2. Meeting May 10, 1982, Item 4a, p. 24.

a. University Administration, Trustee-Administration-Faculty-Student Committee. Art. I.X.E.3. (p. 6), which reads:

"The TAFS Committee shall meet at least five times a year,"
be changed to read:

"The TAFS Committee shall meet on the call of the President or the Chair of the Senate Executive Committee."

3. Meeting May 17, 1982, Item 3, p. 29.

- a. The University Ombudsman. Art. X.V.1.P. shall read as follows:

"p. The University Ombudsman

1. The University Ombudsman shall receive complaints from all members of the University Community, including but not limited to complaints of discrimination or insult based on race, sex, religion, national origin, or handicap. If the Ombudsman finds prima facie substance to a complaint, he or she should refer the complainant to the proper university officer for settlement. Where no satisfactory accommodation can be reached, he or she may recommend appropriate action to the President.
2. The Ombudsman shall be appointed by the President for a biennial term. The President will appoint from a list of at least three names recommended by the University Senate. The Senate Nominating Committee will prepare a slate for consideration by the Senate at its November meeting in alternate years.

In proposing names to the Senate, the Nominating Committee will seek persons of probity, judicious temperament and independence of mind who are well informed on the structure and functioning of the University and who are held in high esteem by their colleagues.

3. The Ombudsman shall report annually to the President and to the University Senate on the number and nature of complaints reviewed and on the settlements reached."



It has become apparent that the name, "Home Economics and Family Studies", has several shortcomings. It exists primarily for historical reasons, and fails to serve current needs in at least the following ways.

1. The entire School has family as its organizing focus, while the present name suggests that there is something called "Home Economics" in the School that is distinct from "Family Studies". There is not.
2. Future directions intended by the School's present leadership include closer and more exclusive attention to family studies. Movement in these directions is hindered by a name that seems to suggest otherwise.
3. Historically, Home Economics began as a kind of Family Studies. Thus, even some traditional home economists have concerns about the present name, which they find to be redundant.
4. The present name suggests that the faculty is primarily composed of people whose primary professional identification is Home Economics. This is not so. I estimate that no more than two regular faculty members regard this as their primary professional identification.
5. While "Home Economics and Family Studies" seems not to communicate the presently intended directions for this School, it does seem to convey an image that is very much not in the School's interest. The idea that we teach cooking and sewing, train women to be better housewives, and are a haven for poorer students, has not died. On the contrary, the existence of this idea has implications that make it more difficult to achieve and maintain high quality.

- (a) High quality students are sometimes put off by the "Home Economics" image, and go elsewhere for only that reason. High school counselors seem to think in terms of Home Economics as it exists in high schools, and tend to recommend us only to the less qualified female students. Similar biases seem to affect prospective graduate students. Thus, student quality--both graduate and undergraduate--suffers partly for reasons of labelling.
- (b) Potential faculty members whose own background is not Home Economics are also put off by our name. It is hard enough to recruit the best people without having to deal with the fact that many people simply do not want to be part of an organization with this name.

The issue at hand for this School is whether it can be moved in one coherent set of directions, with increasingly limited resources focussed in a way that will build on strength and enhance the morale of those faculty members who contribute to our strength, or whether as resources become more limited it will proceed in a less organized way, in a variety of directions with less coherence, and with no clear signal of support to those who can most contribute to high quality. I urge that the name, "Home Economics and Family Studies", be changed to simply "Family Studies", in order to provide this signal of support and to reduce the difficulties described above.

In the last decade or so, many Home Economics programs around the country have changed their names in a variety of directions, all of them having in common that they no longer refer to themselves as Home Economics. In some cases, the name change seems to have been accompanied by new energy and growth in quality, although there are places where the name has changed and nothing else. However, I know of no place in the country where a School has changed its name back to Home Economics. As far as I am aware, all places that have changed their names continue to find the new name preferable.

Our interest in Family Studies as a name goes, however, well beyond a mere interest in image building. I think that there is some growth in a variety of places of a new cluster of disciplines that focus on the family. Some roots of this growth are in what has been called Home Economics, but others are in Medicine, Law, Psychology, and elsewhere. Many of the scholars and professionals involved do in fact think of this as something qualitatively different from their home disciplines. I want the renamed School of Family Studies to be a place where this disciplinary growth can be fostered. If serious effort in this direction can be made here, and if it achieves some success, benefit to the University of Connecticut can be substantial.

In the recently completed history of this School, a number of instances are described in which material originally taught by us evolved into a variety of different entities, which now have very different names, including the current School of Fine Arts, the School of Allied Health, and the School of Education. The material that has remained within this School has also changed, and we intend more change along the lines described above. It is time, I think, for our name to reflect current and anticipated future reality rather than only a past that is remembered dimly and sometimes inaccurately.

As requested, I am providing a list of Schools and Colleges that have or have not changed their names from Home Economics to something else (not including Connecticut). The attached list has been drawn from a recent listing provided by the Association of Administrators of Home Economics in State Universities and Land Grant Colleges.

You will see that the list includes 39 schools and colleges calling themselves Home Economics and 14 with a different name. "Family Studies" or some similar expression (Family Sciences, Family Life, and Family Resources) appears in 5 of the 14 new names, although not as the complete name. There is no School or College that is "Home Economics and", for the obvious reason that names were changed in part to delete the Home Economics label.

In providing this list, I should note that we have some reservations about its significance. That is, many of the Schools and Colleges listed may remain traditional Home Economics units, or may now be transformed in more narrow ways than we desire. Places emphasizing Human Development fall in the latter category.

Our central purpose is to obtain an appropriate label to serve the changes we hope to make, in terms of our own individual situation. The fact that there are other places with similar intentions is more important to us than the fact that many places have different intentions or choose to coast on tradition.

I think that "Family Studies" is the right label for us, and that it will be quite visible around the country, and emulated by others, should we acquire it.

SYNOPSIS OF QUALITY ASSURANCE STUDIES FOR
MEDICAL BOARD AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1. Radiology--Restudy "Time Study of Radiology Reporting".
Study criterion: All radiograph reports will reach the Medical Records within 48 hours after the performance of the procedure.

Although corrective measures have been sought, at the June 25, 1982 Quality Assurance Committee Meeting, the results of a quick restudy of 644 radiological procedures done on out-patients, the turnaround time between the performance of the procedure and the availability of the report for inclusion in the ambulatory record is still greater than 5 days. The inpatient x-ray reports are reaching the Medical Records within 72 hours.

The Quality Assurance Committee brings this to the attention of the Medical Board and suggests another Quality Assurance Meeting in the month of July with members of the Radiology Staff and the Department Chairman to identify measures to close the gap between radiograph taken and inclusion of the report in the patient's record.

II. Electrocardiograms: Time span between performance and appearance of the report in the inpatient record. Date of completion, 9-24-81. Results: in 86% of the cases the EKG was included into the record within 48 hours. Recommended action was to restudy in June or July, 1982 revising the criteria to mandate inclusion of the report in 24 hours. This is to more closely meet the requirements mandated in other hospitals in the Hartford County.


III. Nursing Discharge Summaries on Oncology Patients Discharged from the Fourth Floor. Twenty-seven records were reviewed in all. Seventeen out of those 27 records were without nursing discharge summaries.

Although the restudy showed some improvement in various criteria, there was still a large gap in compliance to such criteria as patient's various psychosocial needs documented in the discharge summaries.

IV. Dietary and Dietary Restudy. The dietary audit completed in 1980 and the restudy completed for March, 1982 are presented together. The dietary audit which was presented in 1980 to the Medical Board was sent back for restudy.

No restudy by the PSRO is advised. The medical staff is to be commended on their compliance to the reasonable criteria governing emergency admissions on Fridays and Saturdays.



UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL

HOSPITAL BYLAWS

Article I - NAME

The hospital shall be known as the JOHN DEMPSEY HOSPITAL of the University of Connecticut (University Hospital).

Article II - OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the hospital shall be:

Section 1.

To establish and maintain as part of the University Health Center (in the Town of Farmington) a permanent facility with inpatient beds and supporting services to provide a clinical resource for the teaching and research programs of the health related professional schools of the University.

Section 2.

To provide diagnostic, treatment and rehabilitative services to individuals in an equitable and humane manner without regard to race, color, creed, national origin or the nature of the source of payment for the care.

Section 3.

To provide a high quality of patient care which will supplement that which is provided in the ambulatory patient care services of the Schools of Medicine and Dental Medicine.

Section 4.

To create an environment which respects the privacy, intelligence and dignity of the patient, including an understanding of the teaching function and the role of individuals participating in the delivery of team care in a university hospital.

Section 4. Committees

a. (Health Center Committee) Health Affairs Committee - The standing subcommittee of the University Board of Trustees known as the (Health Center Committee) Health Affairs Committee shall also serve as the standing subcommittee of the Board of Trustees for matters relating to the University Hospital.

- 1) The committee and its chairperson shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board. It shall consist of the Chairman of the Board, plus up to five members of the Board, with the President of the University and the Vice President for Health Affairs serving as non-voting ex-officio members. Other members of the Health Center administrative staff may be invited to meetings.
- 2) Meetings of the (Health Center Committee) Health Affairs Committee shall be held throughout the year on a regular basis (monthly except during the month of August). The agenda shall be prepared by the chairperson in consultation with the Vice President for Health Affairs.
- 3) The committee shall be concerned with the continuing review of the programs and plans of the Hospital and shall make recommendations to the Board in appropriate areas. These shall include:
 - (a) a periodic review of the financial position and the financial plan for the hospital.
 - (b) recommendations of the Vice President for Health Affairs and Hospital Director with respect to operations, contracts and agreements.
 - (c) a review of the activities of the medical staff particularly as they pertain to the quality of care as reflected in reports of the monthly meetings of the Medical Board and the meetings of the Joint Conference Committee.
 - (d) recommendations from the Medical Board regarding medical staff appointments, the conclusions of grievance procedures, medical staff bylaws and operational policy related to the hospital.

by contract or written agreement drawn up in accordance with existing State statutes. The names and address of officers and Trustees shall be included in the annual report.

ARTICLE IV - ADMINISTRATION

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees shall assure itself by the appointment of appropriate administrative personnel that the operation of the hospital is adequately managed. The Vice President for Health Affairs shall be responsible to the President and the Board for the management and coordination of programs at the University Health Center. A Director of the University Hospital shall be appointed by the Board on the recommendation of the (President) Vice President for Health Affairs to the President and shall be responsible for carrying out the policies and recommendations of the Board and the University administration.

Section 2.

The Director of the hospital shall have responsibility for organizing and administering the hospital as a component unit of the Health Center, including responsibility for:

- a. The application and implementation of policies established by the Board for the operation of the hospital, and the development of new policy proposals for consideration by the Board.
- b. The organization of personnel concerned with the operation of the Hospital.
- c. The selection, employment, control and discharge of employees and the development of proposals for personnel policies and practices for consideration by the Board.
- d. The preparation and submission to the Vice President for Health Affairs for his review of an annual proposed budget showing expected receipts and expenditures. A preliminary budget, which after review by the Vice President for Health Affairs will be incorporated as part of the Health Center and University budget presentation, shall be prepared in May, approximately one year in advance of the effective date. Similarly, a final operational budget shall be submitted for

c. All appointments, reappointments, (and) revocations, or denial of appointments to the medical staff shall be made in accordance with the medical staff bylaws adopted by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2. Medical Care and Its Evaluation

a. The Board shall in the exercise of its discretion delegate to the medical (and dental) staff the responsibility for providing appropriate professional care to hospital patients.

b. The medical (and dental) staff shall conduct a continuing review and appraisal of the quality of professional care rendered in the hospital, and shall report such activities and their results to the Board.

Section 3. Medical Staff Bylaws

There shall be bylaws, rules and regulations for the medical (and dental) staff setting forth its organization and governance. Proposed bylaws, rules and regulations may be recommended by the medical (and dental) staff, but only those adopted by the Board of Trustees shall become effective.

ARTICLE VI - AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be altered and amended by the Board of Trustees of the University of Connecticut through its usual procedures.

SUBJECT: UNIVERSITY OF CONNECTICUT ENDOWMENT FUND - INVESTMENT OBJECTIVES AND STRATEGY

RECOMMENDATION: That the Board of Trustees approve the proposed new investment objectives and strategy for the University's Endowment Fund.

BACKGROUND: The University has been operating under the investment objectives and strategy established and approved by the Board in 1976. In an effort to update those objectives and strategy, we propose the following:

ENDOWMENT GOALS: The primary objective of the University of Connecticut Endowment Fund is reasonable preservation of purchasing power of assets over time. This is defined as achieving a total return (income plus appreciation) in excess of the rate of inflation.

Securities will be chosen on the basis of their potential for above-average, long-term total return. Typically, the market value of equities will fluctuate more than the equity market. In return, total return of equities should exceed the popular stock market indices over the long term. Incremental returns should also be achieved by the debt portion of the portfolio. Current income is not of primary importance and may fluctuate from year to year.

INVESTMENT STRATEGY: It is recognized that a substantial variation in asset allocation between fixed income and equity investments may be appropriate at different times depending upon economic and market conditions. As a long-term strategy, the following guidelines are recommended:

Bonds - 35% - 15%

Equities - 65% - 85% (with short-term reserves for purchase of equities 0-25% of this amount)

SUBJECT: NORTHWOOD/MANSFIELD HOUSING STRATEGY

RECOMMENDATION: That the Board of Trustees approve that the University adopts as a matter of policy the position that it will work in partnership with the Town of Mansfield, Mansfield Housing Authority and private developers to develop the details of a proposed strategy which would result in the improvement, retention or disposition of some of the University-owned properties currently used as rental properties for faculty, staff and student housing. It is the University's intent to insure that any recommended program guarantee a rehabilitation program, appropriate maintenance and management structures and assure that housing for low and moderate income students and staff is provided.

That the Board of Trustees authorize the Vice President for Finance and Administration to enter into negotiations on its behalf which would allow the final details to be developed for such leasing actions.

BACKGROUND: Over the past several years, many reports and recommendations have been made trying to resolve the issues surrounding the operations of the University's rental properties.

As early as 1974 and continuing in 1976, 1980, 1981 and 1982, requests have been made of several organizations to recommend solutions to the problems of managerial policies, deferred maintenance, rising energy costs and rent restrictions resulting in budget deficiencies. Several attempts have been made to resolve the problems with limited success.

Prior to this past year, no adequate options meeting certain acceptable criteria for management, maintenance and overall control have been available.

In response to a Board of Trustees request, a report is being circulated which details a strategy of long-term lease(s), outside financing and private rehab, maintenance and management while retaining some controls through contractual agreements between the University and developer(s) relative to portions of the University's faculty, staff and student housing.

SUBJECT: Update on Fee Requests (Law School)

The University administration's calculation of the adjustments to the General University Fee for the School of Law was in error in the July 1982 presentation. The General University fee, currently approved at \$978 for 1982-83, was proposed to be reduced for 1983-84 to \$310, equivalent to the remainder value of that portion of the fee not transferred to the Tuition Fund. Law Library, financial aid, museum and publication support were transferred into the Tuition Fund and account for a major increase in Law School tuition. The presentation in July contained a mathematical error which overstated the transfer of funding from the General University Fee to the Law School tuition account.

The original University recommendation for the Law School General University Fee was \$310 per year. This must be corrected upwards to a General University Fee of \$470 per year. This adjustment will not affect the proposed tuition rates for the School of Law.

The corrected values for the General University Fee are shown in Attachment I.
